

MAKE CITIZENS AIM OF SCHOOL

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—(AP)—The American School Citizenship which will hold its convention here in connection with the World Conference on Education, June 25-July 6, and the National Educational Association, July 1-6, will have a joint meeting with the National Council of Administrative Women in Education, according to an announcement received here from the League's headquarters in Boston, Mass.

The objects of the American School Citizenship League, it is announced, are as follows:

1. To formulate a definition of American citizenship which may be adopted by the National Educational Association, and the American School Citizenship League. The principal elements to be included in the definition are: Citizenship is a growth, a child is a citizen, a citizen has simultaneous duties relating to the home, community, city or town, state, nation and foreign affairs; citizenship is action; good citizenship is governed by ideals.

2. To propose plans for stimulating the teaching of American citizenship. The welfare of the nation depends upon the teaching of citizenship in such manner as to develop a high purpose to act the role of a good citizen.
3. To make a list of existing books on the teaching of citizenship. Citations from the various courses in citizenship which contain material and plans for teaching the ideals involved in the definition adopted by this committee.

The thousands of educators from all over the world who attend the annual meetings of the World Conference on Education and the N. E. A. have been assured of an opportunity to inspect a representative American citizenship as exemplified in the United States Navy, it has been announced. The commander-in-chief was assigned the U. S. S. California to be stationed in San Francisco Bay during the period of June 25-July 6, in order that the world's educators may make a thorough study of navy educational methods.

Hall Caine's First Book Brought Him Only \$250

LONDON, June 14.—Hall Caine, who recently observed his seventieth birthday, took the opportunity to speak of things as they used to be. Referring to the relations between writers he said: "There comes a time when all writers get stuck in their work and want advice. I knew Wilkie Collins intimately, and whenever I got stuck I would go and see him. Always he would help me without hesitation."

"This comradeship was a common feature of the literary work in those days, not only here but abroad. Flaubert, George Sand and the younger Dumas, to mention only examples, would help one another in difficulties. Today, however, you never hear of that sort of helpfulness, and I think the loss is a great one."

For the manuscript of his first novel, Mr. Caine said, he received \$250 and was supposed to have done well. Literary values have increased enormously since. "When I first came to London," he declared, "the usual arrangement was for a publisher to pay \$200 out and out for a novel. In some cases writers like Wilkie Collins, Charles Reade or Walter Besant had some sort of actuarial valuation made of their potential worth, and sold themselves to the publishers. It was an arrangement which generally operated greatly to the advantage of the publishers."

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WOOL INACTIVE IN THE WEST

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Little activity has characterized the wool situation in the west during the last week, according to reports from the department of agriculture's field representatives.

In California, where most of the clip has been shorn and sold, no transactions were reported. Dealers' sales are drab. One report that reduction on pulled wool of several cents a pound from prices two weeks ago have brought no responses. Further concessions are not unlikely.

No sales were reported from Nevada or Washington. The Montana situation shows no change, but greater activity is looked for soon when shearing becomes more general. The sale of one small clip is reported at

48 cents, but the character of the clip is unknown so the sale cannot be taken as an indication that growers are inclined to accept lower prices.

In Idaho the situation is rather inactive, although Lemhi county reports sales of a few clips at from 42 to 46 cents. Shearing is being interfered with by continued rains. Utah reports indicate that about 39 per cent of the clip has been sold, with little choice wool left. Dealing has been light, with prices tending lower. A few sales have been consummated at from 35 to 44 cents.

Declares Today to Be Golden Age of Medicine

LONDON, June 15.—Cholera, plague, typhus, typhoid, smallpox, tuberculosis and malaria have at last become controllable, says Sir George Newman, chief medical officer of the British government. The antitoxin treatment of diphtheria has reduced the death-rate in that disease from

29.8 per cent in 1890 to 9.3 per cent in 1922, which means that 200 additional lives are saved in every 1000 cases. In 1871 enteric fever claimed 374 lives in each million of the population; in 1922 it was 12 in each million.

"We are living in the golden age of medicine," says Sir George. "Unperceived it is rapidly changing the face of the world and the destinies of men. The extension of the frontiers of life is assisted by fresh air and sunlight in dwellings, sanitation of workshops, wholesome water and food supply, and the isolation of infectious persons. The result of this is seen in the fact that every child born today has an expectation of 12 years more life than had his grandfather."

U. S. NET STARS MATCH BRITONS

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, June 14.—Jimmy Davies and Phil Neer, national intercollegiate doubles champions, will join with Princeton tennis players to form a six-man American team to play a combined Oxford-Cambridge team in an international tennis match at Seabright, New Jersey, during the first week of July, it has been announced here.

Princeton invited Stanford to unite with her to form an American team for this international tournament, and as a result of recent negotiations between Princeton Athletics and the Stanford Board of Athletic Control, the desired competition

has been arranged. Davies and Neer will represent Stanford in the national intercollegiate matches at Haverford, Pa., beginning June 25. The two Stanford players last year won the doubles title, which they will this year defend, and the year before took first and second honors in the singles matches. Neer has for two years been president of the Intercollegiate Lawn Tennis association.

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
