Your best hot-weather "Eats"—Sandwiches

Strawberry Sandwiches
Bread should be cut thin and buttered lightly. Slice large firm strawberries and spread over slices. Sprinkle with blended powdered sugar and cinnamon and cover with second slice. These should be made just before time to serve.

Chicken and Olive Sandwiches
Butter the desired number of slices of bread, and on half of these lay thinly sliced pieces of chicken. On the chicken spread a mixture of minced onion moistened with mayonnaise. Cover with second slice. These should be made just before time to serve.

Watercress Sandwiches
Spread between thin slices of bread a filling made as follows: One-half cup of butter, six tablespoons of minced watercress, one teaspoonful of lemon juice. These ingredients should be thoroughly creamed. Slices need not be buttered.
