GREAT STRIDES SEEN FOR WEST

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 16.—Visions of electrified railroads more common than steam lines are today and fuller development of hydro-electric resources, which will naturally follow or occur simultaneously with greater development of irrigation and agricultural resources, are some of the things Gerard Swope of New York, president of the General Electric company, sees materializing in the west within the next decade or two. Mr. Swope was a recent Salt Lake visitor and while here inspected numerous electrical projects in this vicinity. Electrification of railroads on a large scale Mr. Swope said he believed inevitable. "It is best from an economic viewpoint. Also, more efficiency would be possible. When it is considered that practically one-fourth of all tonnage hauled by steam railroads is coal consumed by the railroads themselves an idea of the proposition may be obtained."

Park to Open June 19
SALT LAKE CITY, June 16.—Owing to the large number of tourists awaiting entry into Yellowstone national park, opening of that resort will take place on June 19, instead of June 26, it was announced here Friday. A special tourist train will leave here for the park on June 18.

ASSOCIATION OF ATTORNEYS MAKE ATTACK

Bar Association of America Fired Attack on Constitution of United States.

(By Associated Press)
NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 15.—Now, at the very apex of the achievements of the Constitution of the United States, when its blessings are apparent to the most casual observer, it is being most bitterly attacked from many quarters, condemned and even execrated as an instrument of oppression and injustice. R. E. L. Sauer, of Dallas, Tex., chairman of the citizenship committee of the American Bar association today told the Tennessee bar association meeting here.

"The Constitution that is being attacked is the one under which our government has achieved for 137 years, has grown in wealth, power, extent of territory and intelligence of its people beyond the wildest dreams of its founders," Mr. Sauer said. "No other people since the dawn of time has been so happy. Under this constitution we have achieved the greatest civil war in history, we have fought four great foreign wars and carried them to triumph and a just and victorious peace, we have become the admiration and envy of the whole civilized world."

Many Assaults.
"But from many quarters it is being assailed. The criticisms come from various classes. From below the anarchists, who would tear down all government, assail it with open violence. This is the least of our danger, however. We can cope with the anarchists."

"There is another element, the parlor socialist, who combine with half-baked educators in a more insidious propaganda. Many of them are people of wealth and position, some of them with humanitarian ideals, some with simply fanatic notions, but they have the power to invade our schools and in our schools, all the way from the first grade up to the highest collegiate institutions, we find here and there a half-baked professor who insidiously injects into the minds of our youth these socialistic ideas. "They would infuse into the mind of America the same ideals of government that prevail in Russia. They are filling our school with text books that contain this propaganda. It is so elusive, so skillful, that it is hard to reach."

Chief Danger.
"But above all, the chief danger lies in men highly placed, men in the Senate and House, lawyers who should know their constitution and its fruits. These demand that the safeguards of the Constitution, the interpretation by the Supreme Court, should be withdrawn; that the legislative branch should be sole judge of the constitutionality of its acts and their conformity to the Constitution. The moment this is done the judiciary and the executive would be prostrate at the feet of the majority in congress. But they even go farther than that. They demand that the decisions of the court shall be sub-

mitted to a vote of the people upon constitutional questions.

"These two proposals, urged by a minority bloc in congress would as effectively destroy this Constitution as anything that the anarchists or secret socialists could do; and still if these two proposals were submitted to the people today they would find thousands of advocates."

Enjoying Freedom.
"The truth is we have so long enjoyed the blessings of freedom, that we have grown indifferent to them. The founders carefully protected the rights of the minority by this written constitution. It was the first time in the history of the world that certain fundamental rights of the individual and minority were guaranteed them by a written instrument superior to the legislative power or the will of the majority. It is an astonishing thing that intelligent people should deliberately attempt to tear down these safeguards and turn the country over to mob rule."

The American Bar association has started a work of education, realizing these dangers. A committee is working through every organization that will assist, through the great fraternal and beneficial organizations, through women's clubs and the League of Women Voters, through patriotic societies and above all, through the American Legion. "A close scrutiny will be made of the text books used in our schools and colleges to eliminate this dangerous and treasonous matter. In this way we hope to check the propaganda. It is the duty of every one of us to repeat by every means within our power these assaults upon our government."

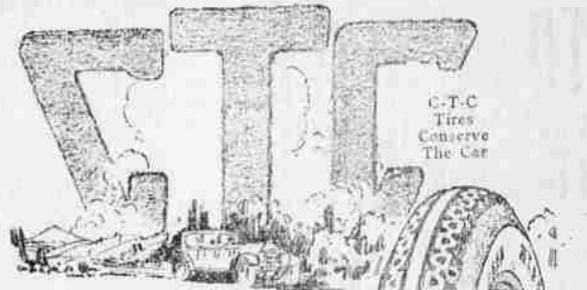
