Baker Pitcher Beats Pirates In Fast Game

be given too much credit on his performance yesterday. He rose to heights of fame that every pitcher hopes to reach some day but that not one in ten does.

White, La Grande's hurler, wasn't pitching bad ball, either. Baker got four hits off him, but Posbury's homer was the only one that did any damage. White pitched one hit in the first, two in the sixth and one in the eighth and marked up 3 strikeouts. Posbury whiffed 13 men and in the fourth and eighth inning fanned every man that faced him.

No Discords
Not a single element of discord crept in throughout the entire game. The umpiring was as faultless as any team should wish, and all else went likewise.

La Grande contributed two errors, but neither did any damage. Buck Knight fumbled one in the fourth, permitting Ansell to reach first, but in the fifth more than made up for his blunder by spiking one of the most spectacular catches of the day. Going west at full speed he ignited down Green's hot one in a difficult catch. Johnson made the other error when he overthrew second base, permitting Green to reach third in the seventh. Green never got any farther, however. Ansell, of Baker, was the only man that looked bad in the field. He made errors in the first and sixth on hits that should have been easily fielded. Baker contributed the other Baker blunder.

Third homer of Posbury's was fresh in a way at that, in that it rolled under the fence. Even if it had been fielded perfectly Posbury could have been sure on third, and Sutherland's single would have scored him.

A large crowd was in attendance and dedicated Baker's new grandstand O. K. Any time Baker dedicates anything they usually do so by winning.

Next Sunday Union is scheduled to meet La Grande how and Baker will go to Cove. By winning yesterday while Cove was inactive, Baker crept to within one-half game of the leaders.

Hibbard did not have the faintest chance against the Argentine giant. Firpo allowed him to go through the first round and then finished him off without delay soon after the bell for the second round.

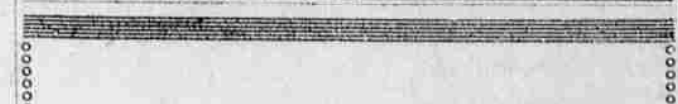
Owing to protests in the newspaper against the unequal match, the promoters on Friday announced that it would be an "exhibition" fight.
