MISS HATCH IS VISITING HERE

Reception to Be Given at the Home of Mrs. A. T. Hill in Honor of Guest of Mr. and Mrs. Mossman.

A distinguished visitor in La Grande is Miss Julia Hatch, who has been the charming house guest of Dr. and Mrs. E. P. Mossman for the past two weeks. Miss Hatch at this time is on furlough from missionary duties in the Kingdom of Siam. In less than two months she will again sail for Siam where she will continue to be the principal of the Phrachaya Girls' School at Chienmai in northern Siam. Chienmai is the second city in size in the kingdom and the Presbyterian church has there established a Mission Press, Theological Training School, Prince Royal's college, Girls' school, Leper asylum, McCormick hospital, numerous churches and primary schools beside being the center for many evangelistic out-stations. Twenty-one workers are very ably supervising these many activities.

For thirty years Miss Hatch has been in service under the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian church and has been the special representative of the Presbyterian women of the whole Eastern Oregon. She has visited in La Grande several times during this period of years and it was therefore a very special privilege at this time to welcome her, for many to meet her, for others to renew the acquaintance of former years and for all to hear of the very splendid work which she is doing in this field. Miss Hatch is not only been the recipient of many functions here at which she most graciously spoke of her work but also has been especially honored with functions at Baker, Union and Enterprise. In honor of Miss Hatch there will be given a reception at the spacious home of Mrs. Albert Thomas Hill at 1608 First street, on Tuesday afternoon from the hour of two-thirty until five. A very fine musical program will be enjoyed during the afternoon. To this all the ladies of the city who would like to meet Miss Hatch are most cordially invited.

Future Of Russia

Varied opinions have been expressed recently by persons who profess to know something of the situation in Russia on what would be the effect if Lenin should die.

Count Ilya Tolstoy, son of the noted Russian author, who is in the United States, expresses the opinion that if Lenin should die, changes in Russia would be inevitable, because there is no one in the soviet circle who is big enough to take his place. He considers Trotsky an adventurer and not capable of succeeding as head of the soviet regime.

In contrast to this opinion is a statement of a member of the soviet government, that the bolshevist system had been so well organized in Russia that the death of Lenin or any other individual would not make any important changes in the government. The Russian people, this spokesman says, have come to accept the communist government.

Information and opinions respecting Russia since the government was seized by the bolsheviks have been so conflicting that reasonable deductions by students of world affairs has not been possible. Men of ability from a number of other nations, including the United States, have visited Russia, but their reports do not coincide to a degree that would inspire confidence in their dependability.

Count Tolstoy knows a great deal about Russian character, and he admits there is no organized movement against the control of the bolsheviks, whom he estimates at about 400,000. Efforts to break the grip of the communist on Russia have failed, and there does not seem to be anything in evidence that would encourage the belief that the death of Lenin would make it any easier for a revolt to be successful.
