Story on Pageant—The pioneer pageant, "How the West Was Won" will be described by Victor Shaw in the Saturday Evening Post, it was learned at Walla Walla, when Shaw arrived to consult Publicity Manager Ed Engell with regard to material and pictures for the pageant phase of his article on the general subject of western trails. Shaw left Monday night for Pendleton. He will attend the Oregon Trail meeting at Meacham, Ore., on July 3, and at Baker on July 4, to get material concerning the Oregon Trail, states the Portland press.

Staking of Cows Taboo—No more will the permitting of cows to be staked in the streets in the corporate limits of the city be tolerated, announced Chief Clint Haynes today. "Cows, either staked out or unattended in the streets, have become a nuisance that is coming in many complaints from residents in La Grande and hereafter all animals found either wandering through the streets or staked therein, will be dealt with according to the law." Many sidewalks have also been reported damaged in the section where wooden sidewalks prevail which is only one more reason why the police department will keep the lid down on such practices.

Ken Siegrist Wins Honor—Gold medal for scholarship presented by the alumni association of Hill Military in a talk given by Frank Whalley Watson, president of the alumni, was awarded William "Clain" of Tacoma, who led all departments. Ted Letter, son of O. C. Letter of Portland and Kenneth Siegrist tied for first honors in scholarship in the intermediate department and Henry Pitcock, won primary department honors. Take Trail Pictures—Cl. W. Lyman, automobile editor of the Oregonian, is making a trip from Pendleton to Ontario, over the Old Oregon Trail taking pictures of the pageant grounds and scenic spots along the way. Mr. Lyman expressed the belief that while the unfinished section of the trail west of Meacham is not in good shape, a few days of weather and work by the state highway department will put it in the condition. "Except for this one section of about six miles, the road from Portland is in splendid condition," he said.—Baker Democrat.

A call has been issued for cowboys who are asked to come in full cowpuncher attire—not merely a rough shirt and the like, but in chaps and all that goes with it.—The association will furnish free facilities to the horses of all who participate.

Special Trains Announced. Passenger Yanderwater of the U. P. railroad, announced that special trains would run to Top O' Blue Mountains during the pageant from Baker, Walla Walla and Pendleton and also that any who desired Pullman accommodations might get same by booking together in groups of 25, the capacity for each car. Those who wish this sort of reservations should immediately get in touch with the secretaries of the respective Chambers of Commerce in Eastern Oregon as necessary reservations must be made immediately. All such Pullman cars will be parked at the pageant site for as long a period as their occupants wish and will give the occupants full sleeping and other facilities.

To Announce Fights. Preparations have been made to receive wire news of the Dempsey-Gibbons fight at Shelby, Montana at the pageant grounds where they will be announced to the multitudes.

Charles Wright, of Haines, who was present yesterday, brought in the quota of his town on the underwriting budget.

No Excessive Charges. The meeting yesterday discussed the apparently malicious purpose of many who have scattered reports of excessive charges to be levied on tourists in Western Oregon. It was reported that a La Grande business man said that the charge would be \$3, which is untrue. The charge will be 50 cents to adults and 25 cents for children, with free parking and camping facilities.
