### School Election.

## HISTORICAL POST FOUND IN IDAHO

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, June 21.—A post believed to have been used as a mile post when the Idaho and Washington territories were surveyed in 1872 was found recently by Robert Lang, timber cruiser, a few miles east of the state line near Hauser lake.

The post is of yellow pine, hand hewn, about five inches square and three feet long. Carvings on its four sides read: "Mile Post 75, Idaho Territory, 1872" and "Washington Territory." It is planned to add the 50-year-old post to the collection of the state historical society at Boise.

## BEER DISPLACES SAKE

TOKIO, June 21.—Beer is rapidly replacing sake as the national drink of Japan. While there has been no appreciable increase in the output of distilleries which produce sake, the increase in the amount of beer brewed is very marked. Ten years ago 21,288 koku of beer were brewed; last year the consumption was 765,027 koku.

## STEEDS PRANCE TO BAND MUSIC

### Old Oregon Trail Pageant Cavalry to Train Within Hearing of Band Concert Tonight.

The freight bill on the saddles and other equipment sent from Camp Lewis to be used by the cavalry detachment at the Old Oregon Trail celebration at Top O' Blue Mountain July 2 and 4, has arrived according to advices from Ralph Huron, in charge of the organization and training of the troop. Railroad officials state that the shipment left Camp Lewis Tuesday and that it will arrive here Saturday, which means that on Sunday it will be put in use.

Despite the heavy rainfall last evening, 25 members were out for practice in the mounted drills. A large turnout is expected tonight and in conjunction with the band concert, the horses will be ridden within hearing distance so as to give them an initiation into the mysteries of "stepping to music."

The detachment is practically complete but anyone interested is urged to enroll. Forty men will be needed to complete the troops and several substitutes also in case any of the 40 should be unable to participate. Practice is held at the fairgrounds each evening at 6:30 o'clock.
