tarians, the doors were closed to all members of the private party except the president and his secretary. Police denied admission to all alike including local authorities, the newspapermen traveling with the president.

Plans for World Court—ST. LOUIS, June 22.—President Harding placed before the court Thursday night a renewed plea for American adherence to the permanent court of international justice, "as the one and only existing

'agency of peace' to which we can safely subscribe without violating the basic principles of our national being."
 Making the first prepared address of his western trip, the president said that to bring about the end he desired he "would gladly wipe out financial difference," and proposed a reconstruction of the machinery of the international tribunal "to dispose conclusively of all other cited apprehensions of danger from the exercise of any influence whatsoever, either open or furtive, by the league of nations or by any other organization."

"This could be done in one of two ways," he asserted, "first, by empowering the court itself to fill any vacancy arising in the death of a member or retirement for whatever cause without interposition from any other body; or, second, by continuing the existing authority of the permanent court of arbitration to nominate and elect by council and assembly of the league to the remaining members of the court of justice."

Should Submit Terms—Then, anticipating the "voice of the doubter" who might inquire whether the 40 nations now represented on the court would consent to these changes in the structure of the tribunal, Mr. Harding answered that "to submit terms which we consider essential to the preservation of our nationality is not an act of discourtesy. It is the only fair, self-respecting nation can do."
 The crux of the conditions suggested, the president described as the "making of the world court precisely what its name implies."

18 YEAR OLD BOY IS HUNG FOR MURDER

 ject to the death penalty. It was finally established that Campbell was 18 on November 19, 1922, while Davis did not reach that age until March 5, 1923. Davis pleaded guilty in the Imperial County superior court. He was sentenced to life imprisonment for first degree murder on April 14. Campbell was convicted by a jury and was sentenced to hang.

It was brought out in Campbell's trial that he ran away from home at Marquette, Mich., to join the navy, but was discharged from the service as undesirable. Davis came from Birmingham, Ala., and had served a term in the Alabama reformatory. Judge Franklin J. Cole, of the Imperial County superior court, in passing the sentence to Campbell, said: "This may seem severe punishment to you, but the evidence showed this to have been a most atrocious murder. If your execution deters others from committing similar crimes, it will be worth while to the people of this state."

In regard to Davis, the court said: "The law prohibiting the execution of a murderer of this sort merely because of his age is impracticable and should be repealed. The jury which tries a murderer is certainly in better position to determine the punishment for the crime than the legislature. This was a particularly atrocious crime and it is regrettable that this defendant cannot be compelled to share the penalty the law requires of the accomplice, Campbell. This case should be cited to the legislature and perhaps it would aid in modifying the law concerning hanging."

Governor Friend Richardson made an early move to block any plan for executive clemency for Campbell when he said on April 14 that the "sob sisters of California will only be wasting their time and energy" in imploring him to save the life of Lawrence Campbell. "The governor is not only in an advocate of capital punishment, but he believes that 'every woman in the state should work for its engagement.'"

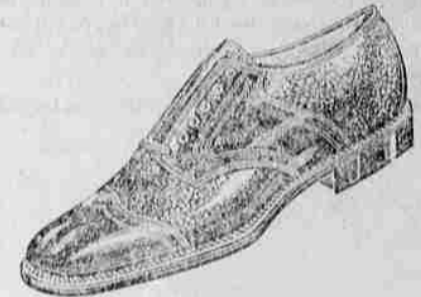

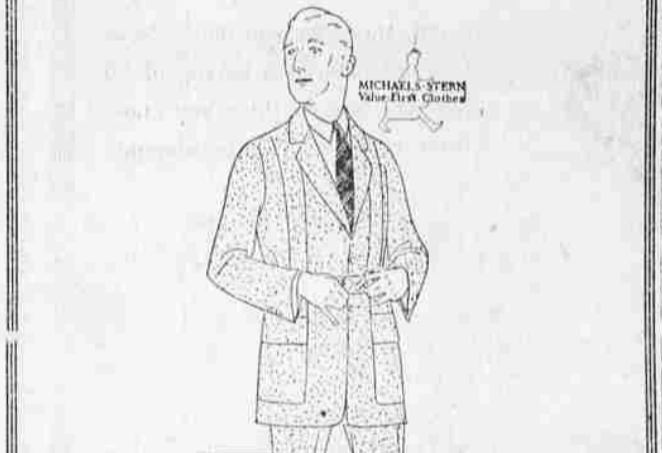
