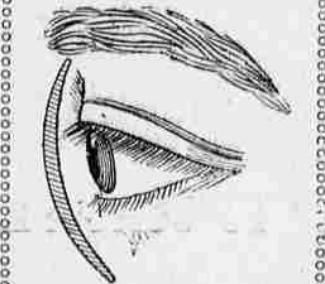

## PRESBYTERIANS TO CONVENE IN JULY

**SPOKANE, Wash., June 23.**—The governing body of the Presbyterian church of Washington and northern Idaho will hold its 1923 convention at Whitworth college, 19 miles north of Spokane, July 19 to 23 inclusive.

The territories and grounds of the college will be used by the delegation for living quarters, and meals will be served on the campus by local church women. About 20 ministerial and lay delegates are expected, according to Dr. Sherman L. Dixie, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Spokane.

Speakers will include Dr. W. S. Holt of Philadelphia, in charge of ministerial relief; Dr. Cleland B. McAfee, McCormick seminary, Chicago; Dr. Gerrit Verkynt, New York; the Rev. Harry L. Bowley, New York; and Dr. Edgar D. Hill, New York.

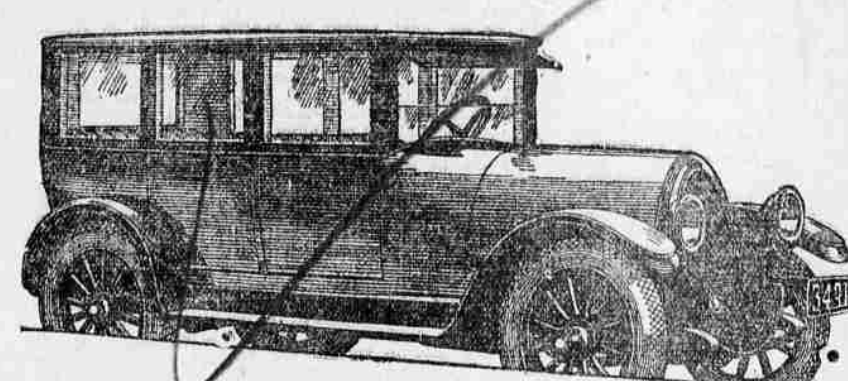
**EVEN IN TENNIS PLAY.**
