Robinson of La Grande won the Past Grand Collar and T. Powmen of Elgin won prize for best I. O. O. F. talk.

On Saturday, President Jesse Gram gave the address of welcome and Henry McGoldrick gave the welcoming address. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, R. H. Borig of Union; vice-president, A. Hanson; secretary, W. V. Connor; treasurer, James Moss. The association will meet next year at Union.

The afternoon session was pleasantly spent with several musical selections by several Summerville and Elgin people and Mrs. McPherson of La Grande. 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seizures will continue. Some of the writers take the British government sharply to task for what is characterized as its passive attitude and its apparent intention to make the steamship companies fight out the issue with the American government.

Some of the newspapers take a stronger view of the situation and say the issues may lead to grave international complications unless the United States relaxes its "ridiculous laws."

ENFORCEMENT OF PROHIBITION TO BE STRICT

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as other laws are presumed to be executed.

"What I am saying must not be construed as indicating any relaxation of the national government's purpose to do its full duty in this matter. I have no doubt that if the burden in fact, in undue proportion, upon the national authority the Federal government will, not only under this administration but under whatever others may come in the future, enforce and discharge the full obligation. But I am pointing out that this ought not to be necessary. The national policy ought to be supported by the public opinion and the administrative machinery of the whole

country. For myself, I am confident that we are passing now through the most difficult stage of this matter, and that as time passes there will be a more and more willing compliance by authorities everywhere of the unalterable obligation of law enforcement. The country and the nation will not permit the law of the land to be made a byword.

"It is a curious illustration of loose thinking that some people have proposed, as a means of protecting the fullest rights of the states, that the states should abandon their part in enforcing the prohibitory policy. That means simply an invitation to the Federal government to exercise power which should be exercised by the states. Instead of being an assertion of State rights, it is an abandonment of them. It is an abdication. It amounts to a confession by the state that it doesn't choose to govern itself but prefers to turn the task, or a considerable part of it, over to the Federal authority. There could be no more negation of state rights.

"I am making my appeal in this matter to the broadest and best sentiments of law-abiding Americans everywhere. We must recognize that

There are some people on both sides of this question in whose minds it is absolutely paramount. Some would be willing to sacrifice every other consideration of policy or order to have their own way as to this one. This constitutes one of the most demoralizing factors in the situation. Moralizing factors in the situation, that the adoption of the Constitutional amendment would take the question out of our politics. Thus far it has not done so, though I venture to predict that neither of the great parties will see the time, within the lives of any who are now voting citizens, when it will declare openly for the repeal of the eighteenth amendment. But despite all that, the nation is kept in politics because of the almost fanatical urgency of the minority of extremists on both sides. Unless, through the recognition and acceptance of the situation in its true light, through the effective enforcement of the law by all the constituted authorities and with the acquiescence of the clearly dominant public opinion of the country, the question is definitely removed from the domain of political action, it will continue a demoralizing element in our whole public life. It will be a permanent bar to the wise determination of many issues directly unrelated to the liquor question. It will be the dispute upon our community, and be pointed to as justifying the charges that we are a nation of hypocrites. There can be no issue in this land paramount to that of enforcement of the law.

"It is easy to understand the conditions part of which much unrest has developed, but it is not easy to comprehend so much of complacency, and a developing peril. I want to give warning against that peril."

"Many citizens, not contenters in their habits, lawfully acquired stores of private stocks in anticipation of prohibition, pending the ratification of the amendment and the enactment of the regulatory law. The latter practice is rather too costly to be indulged in by the masses, so there are literally American millions who resent the lawful possessions of the few, the lawless practices of a few more, and rebel against the denial to the vast majority. Universal prohibition in the United States would occasion far less discontent than partial prohibition and partial indulgence.

"It is the partial indulgence which challenges the majesty of law, but the greater crime is in the impairment of the moral fiber of the Republic. The essential millions have the example of law defiance by those who can afford to buy, and are reckless enough to take the risk, and there is incited a contempt for law which may some day find expression in far more serious forms.

"I do not see how any citizen who cherishes the protection of law in organized society may feel himself secure when he himself is the example for contempt for law. Clearly, there is call for awakened conscience and awakened realization of true self-interest on the part of the few who will themselves suffer most when reverence for law is forgotten and passion

is expressed in destructive lawlessness. There must be a law-abiding republic, and reverence and obedience must spring from the influential and the leaders among men, as well as obedience from the humbler citizen, else the temple will collapse.

"Whatever satisfaction there may be in indulgence, whatever objection there is to the so-called invasion of personal liberty, neither counts when the supremacy of law and the stability of our institutions are menaced. With all good intention the majority sentiment of the United States has sought to remove strong drink as a curse upon the American citizen, but ours is a larger problem now to remove lawless drinking as a menace to the Republic itself."

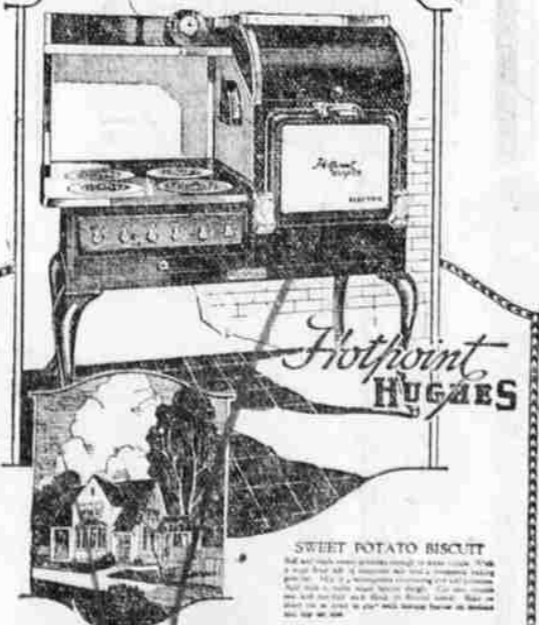

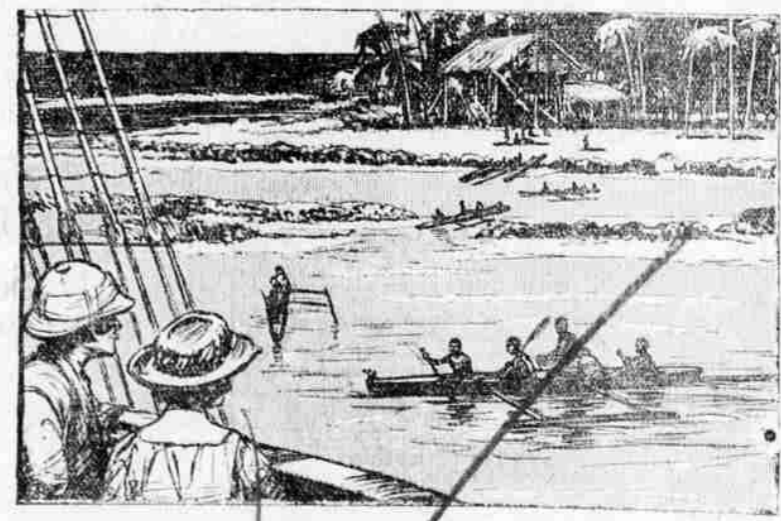
