to capture the outlaws. However, a posse was quickly formed and the outlaws are today reported to be hiding in the hills which are being scoured by the officers.

A check of the valuables and money taken by the robbers showed that nearly \$3,000 in jewelry and over \$55,000 cash were pilfered from the new arrivals.

That's what happened here Saturday afternoon—as a forerunner of the Old Oregon Trail pageant to be staged at Top O' Blue Mountains to witness a mammoth pageantry and to hear President Harding speak.

Many Saw Play

One of the largest crowds ever assembled in La Grande for anything less than a circus witnessed the hold-up. Adams avenue, from Fourth to Fifth, was one solid mass of spectators and the windows of the business buildings held their share of onlookers.

Joe Woods, who will drive the Concord stage at the pageant that will carry President Harding from his special train to the official stand, drove a six-horse team of beautifully trained bays and G. L. Larison, president of the Union County Chamber of Commerce, C. J. Klamath, secretary of the city commission, Bruce Dennis, editor of the Evening Observer, August Stange, of the Mt. Emily timber company, Earl Zundell, assistant cashier of the La Grande National bank, and T. J. Scroggins, cashier of the United States National bank, were the occupants of the stage.

Claude Scranton led the band of robbers which consisted of Earl Reynolds, Lee Reynolds, Floyd McKennon and Mr. Bean. Charles Runyan and his assistants served as police—incidentally Mr. Runyan is chief of police during "business week" and G. S. Brian is judge.

Had the streets been in better condition, Mr. Woods would have undoubtedly put his team of horses through many of the "tricks" of former days but due to the wetness of the streets no special performance was staged.

John Cournoy, one of the La Grande feed barns, owns four of the horses and Earl Walsinger, of Albee, the two wheel horses that make up the six horse team that Mr. Woods drove Saturday and will drive during the Old Oregon Trail pageant.

Disabled Men Promised Aid
DENVER, June 25.—President Harding's first official act after his arrival here Sunday for a visit of more than 24 hours, was to assure the soldier sick at the army's general hospital that he would keep "everlastingly at it" to see that full justice was meted out by the government to its wounded and needy veterans of the World war, and would "consecrate" himself, his every influence and endeavor, to prevent further war on the part of the United States.

"But," Mr. Harding said, addressing a group who assembled to welcome him and Mr. Harding to the hospital, "I want to tell you if ever there is another war, we will do more than draft the boys. If I have anything to do with it, we will draft every dollar and every other essential."

To the sick in the ward the president also gave a word of cheer while Mrs. Harding went from cot to cot, handing each patient a flower and leaving a message of love and good wishes as she passed on. One pale-faced soldier, who had lost both limbs, told the first lady in answer to the solicitations, that he "was all right and feeling fine." His wife, who sat beside the cot, said, "Jack tells all the visitors that, but then he was always a good sport."

To Whom It May Concern: Whereas, The State Game Commission of the State of Oregon is authorized under Sections 8, Chapter 66, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, to close any open season or open any closed season in any county or district of the State of Oregon for the hunting, shooting, killing and possession of game animals and game birds; therefore.

Notice is hereby given that the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon has made and entered of record and does hereby issue the following:

ORDER That the open season as defined in Section 10, Chapter 153, of the General Law of Oregon, 1921, for hunting, shooting, killing, taking and having in possession, alive or dead,

the following named game animals and game birds respectively, in the State of Oregon, shall be as follows, to-wit:

The open season for deer with horns throughout the entire State shall be and is hereby declared to be from September 10th to October 31st of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Silver Gray squirrels in all sections of the State where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from September 15th to October 15th of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Chinese Pheasants and Bobwhite Quail in all sections of Game District No. 1, where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Quail in all sections of Game District No. 2 where there is an open season, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Quail in all sections of Game District No. 2 where there is an open season, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Quail in all sections of Game District No. 1, where there is an open season, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on California Valley Quail in all sections of Game District No. 1, where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Blue or Sooty Grouse, Ruffed Grouse or Native Pheasants in all sections of the State where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from September 15th to October 31st of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Sage Hens in all sections of the State where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from August 1st to August 15th of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Hungarian Partridges in Umatilla County shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Third Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

Notice is also hereby given that the changes in the open seasons made by this order in nowise affect the bag limits or other regulations provided by law respecting the hunting, shooting, killing, taking or having in possession, alive or dead, of such game animals and game birds.

Any and all persons hunting for shooting, killing, taking or having in possession, alive or dead, any deer, Silver Gray Squirrel, Chinese Pheasant, Bobwhite Quail, Mountain Quail, Blue or Sooty Grouse, Ruffed Grouse or Native Pheasant, Sage

Hens, Hungarian Partridges or Prairie Chickens in the State of Oregon, in violation of this Order, will be prosecuted as by law provided.
