10 000 GATHER IN A. M. A. MEET

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Ten thousand persons from every state in the union and from many foreign countries are here to attend the seventy-fourth annual convention of the American Medical Association, which opens today and continues until next Thursday, according to official estimates made by the association's officials.

The opening meeting of the scientific assembly of the A. M. A. will be held Tuesday night, with Dr. E. E. Schmitt of Baltimore, president of the American Medical Association, president, Dr. Roy Lewis Wilbur, president of Stanford University, president-elect, will be installed. Dr. Wilbur is the seventy-fifth president of the A. M. A. and the only westerner ever to hold the position.

This is the first A. M. A. convention to be run on a statewide basis. Association officials stated here. Heretofore the convention city was host to the delegates, but this year's convention is a California meet with post-convention clinics being held in Los Angeles, San Diego, Santa Barbara, Riverside and other California cities. More than 2,500 state doctors are here for the meet, officials announced. A total of 136 diagnostic clinics will be held in San Francisco and Oakland, with more than 200 post-convention clinics being held throughout the state.

Immediately before and during the A. M. A. meet, the annual conventions of sixteen branches of medical societies will be held in San Francisco and one in Los Angeles. Convening at 9 a. m. on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, the various sections of the A. M. A. will meet. General and abdominal ophthalmology, diseases of children, pharmacology and therapeutics, nervous and mental diseases, dermatology and syphilology, preventive and industrial medicine, and public health.
