Ralph Comstock visited at the Morris home in Lower Cove last Sunday.

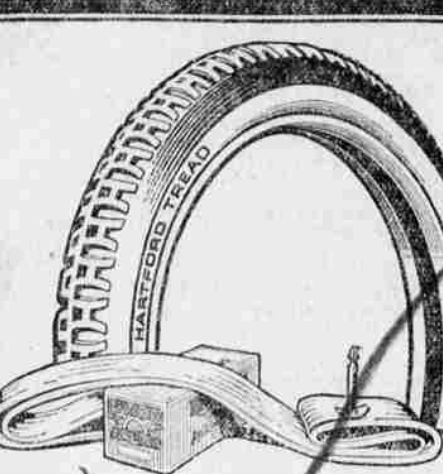
Mrs. John Comstock of Idaho is visiting friends and relatives in this vicinity.
