## SWAP 'SADDLE' FOR 'GRECIAN'

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., June 27.—The art of changing "saddle noses" to "Grecian straight" of Apollo 92 Venus design will be demonstrated by Dr. Lee Cohen of Baltimore, Md., at the seventy-fourth annual convention of the American Medical Association. The art, technically known as corrective rhinoplasty, will be one of the features of the scientific exhibit being held at the Civic Auditorium in connection with the A. M. A. meet. The photographs and models on display show individuals with grotesque "saddle" noses, with a "before and after" effect. To overcome a "saddle nose," Dr. Cohen points out, it is merely necessary to graft a part of a rib where the nose should be. Dr. Cohen, who will address the convention next Friday, points out through his exhibit the prerequisite to success in all plastic work is a well-rounded surgical training, which, he says, is often lacking in those attempting corrective treatments on the nose. Work of inexperienced men, he says, often results disastrously for the patient.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 27.—The "Hot Air Line," more properly known as the Spokane and British Columbia railway, seems to be no more, either in fact or prospect. Its peculiar history, as far as Washington is concerned, apparently came to a close recently with the purchase by Ferry county of the entire right-of-way from Republic, Washington, to the Canadian line.

The "Hot Air Line" was originally planned to connect Spokane with Vancouver, B. C., by way of Republic and the San Paul river. Offices were opened in Spokane in 1919. Surveys were run down the Spokane river to the Columbia and along the Columbia to the San Paul valley, up which an easy water grade was laid out to Canada.

Rails were laid from Republic north, and actual train service maintained to connect with the Canadian Pacific. The service was abandoned, and further development was checked, by an agreement some years ago with the Great Northern, which also serves Republic.

## WOULD ELIMINATE STATE SPEED LAWS

SPOKANE, Wash., June 27.—State speeding laws would be eliminated and reckless driving statutes substituted by the adoption of a proposal planned for the next session of the state legislature by Justice S. A. Mann representative. The principal would be that any action of an auto driver which endangers the life, limb, or property of another person, would be a violation of the law.

There are few drivers, who keep within the 30-mile state, or the lower city, limits," Justice Mann said in announcing his proposal. "Still there are drivers who endanger the lives of others without, in the scope of our present legislation, placing themselves in danger of arrest."
