HUGE SHIP PLANNED.

LONDON, June 28.—An airship to carry 200 passengers on a regular service between Hamburg and New York, says the London Daily News, is now in course of construction. The ship will be more than 900 feet long, fitted with 12 engines of 260 horsepower each, giving a speed sufficient to make the journey between the two cities in 45 hours.

When not in flight the plane is designed to float on the surface of the docks at Hamburg and New York.

KEARNS HOLDS FINAL PAYMENT UNCERTAIN

SHELBY, Mont., June 28.—The contract for taking the picture of the Gibbons-Dempsey fight was sold for \$5000 to a Los Angeles company Wednesday night, it was announced. After bickering all day with local officials, Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, turned his interest in the film, announced as 55 per cent of the proceeds, into the hands of Mayor Jim Johnson, treasurer of the fight, Loy J. Molunby, American Legion commander, Eddie Kane, Gibbons' manager, and Mike Collins, matchmaker, for disposal as they saw fit.

Despite definite assurance by local fight officials that they will have the final \$100,000 guaranteed the champion by July 2, when it is due, Kearns said he believed it was "still uncertain" at this time, whether the money would be available. Until there is a breach of contract which does not provide for payment of the third \$100,000 until July 2, he will go ahead with plans for the fight, he declared.

LENGLÉN AHEAD IN WIMBLEDON PLAY

WIMBLEDON, June 28.—There were no surprises in the play for the world's tennis championships at Wimbledon Wednesday afternoon and only one big thrill. This was when Suzanne Lenglen appeared in the stadium which was crowded almost to capacity, to start after her fifth successive world's title. She began in characteristic manner, winning every game of the two set match from young Peggy Ingram. Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory, the American champion, scored an easy triumph over Miss H. L. Eddie of England, 6-3, 6-2. Mrs. Mallory's play seemed to lack the force and speed it once had.

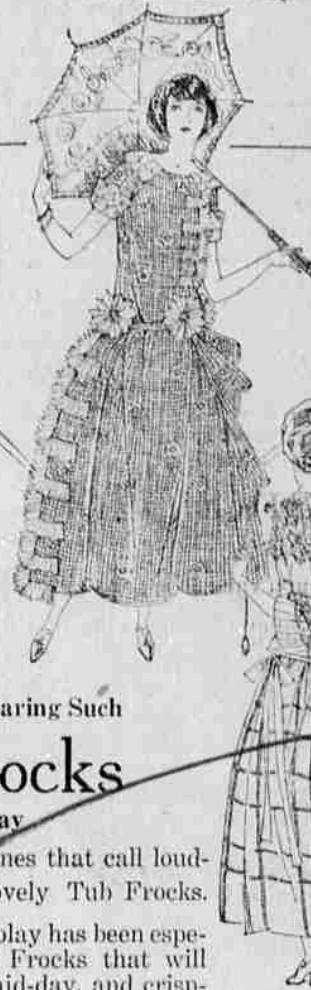
