Some time last year I went down Portland with your Bishop, to meet the French general that been in the war of the world and European countries and never thought it would take such long journey at that time. Also have met there the honorary lady from east and have forgot her name (Miss Alice Robertson, then woman member of congress).

You have introduce me to her alright and to big society people, also big men around Portland, and was glad to meet them. Now you have been telling me, my friend Bishop, to help the Old Oregon Trudy celebration at Meacham. Still I don't feel like to go unless I get interpreter. Sometimes I afraid to go and all my bones are kindly holding me down; pretty old now, about 70, but perhaps I go anyway—I maybe meet many big men at the celebration.

I have always believe in my own religion; all these buckskin customs and war bonnets and feather flags made of eagles never believe in no white man's way. I will take along my own rifles if I do go up and participate in the celebration. As long as the sun appears to me and giving me enough light to walk on and meet my friends and shake hands with them, I will let the sun take a good picture at us.

This earth was made for us to walk on and enjoy ourselves and visit each other from different parts of the country. Right today I want out airplane and automobile and get passenger train taking people to east and west daily.

Our happy hunting ground have disappeared for good never to return to us. We used to roam the wild country was by little cayuse with two pole fasten on each side. All these things—we still cling to them and most of us don't belong no churches of any kind.

Now you starting the big play at Meacham. Where there was nothing but narrow trails enough for little cayuse to go through I don't know how white people clear the Blue mountains on such dangerous road, I used to see lots of immigrants camping above my place when going west, mostly barefoot, patched pants—torn shirts—going with ox team and ox team mule mixed.

I will do better if I get good interpreter to translate for me.

BAKER HEARS FROM SENATOR

Wire Received Concerning Baker Irrigation Project; Governor Davis Will Lend Aid.

BAKER, June 29.—A telegram received by W. G. Meacham, secretary of the Baker County Chamber of Commerce, from Senator Charles L. McNary, contains encouraging news relative to the Baker irrigation project. The message quotes communications received from C. W. Pugsley, acting secretary of agriculture and from D. W. Davis, commissioner of the reclamation service. The telegrams speak for themselves being as follows:

Mr. Pugsley:—

"Since congress has made an appropriation for initiating this we are advising the Interior Department that it does not seem advisable for this department to reopen the question of its feasibility, unless directed by congress to do so."

Governor Davis:—

"Present situation respecting the Baker project is that advice from the agriculture department is expected. I shall keep you in touch with this and try to promote a decision as I share your interest in agreeing upon a feasible project to Oregon and securing its construction."

SPECIAL SQUAD IS WATCHING THIEVES

SPOKANE, Wash., June 28.—Automobile thieves are now being combated in Spokane by a special squad of four policemen under the personal direction of Chief of Police Westey T. Turner. The squad is somewhat similar to an automobile squad which has operated successfully in Portland for more than two years.

According to Joe Keller, former police captain of Portland, who was here recently, car thefts in Portland for the year 1921 were 142 less than in 1922 alone, before the auto squad was formed. Portland had but 29 unrecovered cars last year and Spokane had 40, he said.

Chief Turner, commenting on the plan, said "criminals specializing in their work and to successfully combat them, officials must specialize to a certain extent at least."

Sanatorium for Woodmen

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 28.—A feature of the annual convention of the Woodmen of the World here early in July will be dedication to the order's new war memorial sanatorium, erected at San Angelo for members of the society afflicted with tuberculosis.

The hospital will care for 1,500 patients, and is the first of four to be established in four states for the treatment of tuberculosis.
