## Crews To Be In Game With Powder Boys

Crews, manager of the La Grande Pirates, will be in the line-up against North Powder at North Powder tomorrow, came today upon his return from Portland where he has spent the past week. Crews, who in addition to being manager of the Pirates, is one of the strongest fielders and hitters on the team, will probably play at shortstop. With his return La Grande is assured of seeing the fastest Pirate aggregation of the year in action at North Powder and from indications, quite a number of fans are planning on making the trip to the rocky town Sunday to witness the game.

Selection of the pitcher who will start against the Powderites Sunday has not been made but with four to pick from the hurling material is not lacking. Matchmaker Mike Collins, who arranged the big bout, also had charge of the preliminaries, and has lined up what would be an all-star card if it were not for the two who meet in the battle climax.

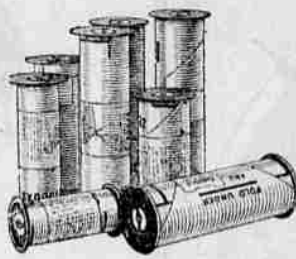
Jimmy Delaney not so long ago, and before he was 21 year old, gave light heavy-weight champion, Gene Tunney, a fierce battle for ten rounds. Some of the critics gave Tunney a shade and others called it a draw. Jimmy is a pupil of Mike Gibbons. He absorbed much of the phantom's cleverness. He has been training daily with Tom Gibbons. Delaney will meet Jack Burke of the Dempsey camp in a ten-round bout. Burke has been one of the stars of Dempsey's training campaign. He is the one boxer who ap-

pears to make a showing against Jack in the boxing line.

Two colored heavies battle in another ten-round engagement. George Godfrey, protégé of Jack Johnson's and also a veteran of the Dempsey camp, meets Jack Thompson of Boston. Godfrey is the best of the colored heavies in the opinion of Johnson, who worked with him daily for six months. Thompson recently fought Johnson in Havana, going the full distance. He has done most of his fighting through the south. He is described as a 220-pounder with a punch in either mitt.

Bud Gorman, who holds a decision over Eddie McGoorty, will battle Harry Drake in an eight-round preliminary opening the show. Gorman, seating around 200, is the heaviest man in the Dempsey camp. He is fast and sassy for a big fellow, and the daily instruction from Tom has improved him greatly. Drake, an Englishman, is the cleverest man in the Dempsey camp. He will outshine Gorman from this angle, but lacks the punching power of Bud.

The first preliminary is carded to start at 12 o'clock noon. Preceding this, the two bands on opposite sides of the ring will blare out jazz and semi-classical pieces to entertain the crowd before the contestants in the opening fight climb into the ring.

## BAKER TO PLAY COVE TOMORROW

BAKER, June 30.—One game from the top and a hard game to beat. That is the way things look for Manager Hunt and his Colts Sunday. ## DEMPSEY-GIBBONS BATTLE ASSURED

GREAT FALLS, June 30.—The Jack Dempsey-Tom Gibbons heavyweight championship fight, twice threatened with collapse within the last two weeks because of financial crisis, has cleared the last hurdle and will be decided in Shelby, July 4, as scheduled. The final \$100,000 of Dempsey's \$200,000 guarantee was raised Friday night from 20 influential business men of the state, who pledged \$5000 each.

George H. Stanton, president of the Stanton Trust & Savings bank, who personally advanced \$50,000 to make Dempsey's second \$100,000 installment 10 days ago, made the positive announcement that the final installment had been raised and that it would be available in cash not later than Saturday night. Mr. Stanton said that the money, however, would not be turned over to Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager until Monday, the date on which the payment falls due, just that.

The raising of the \$100,000 is one Kearns' face was wreathed in

of the most remarkable financial achievements in the history of glove fighting. After all plans had failed, Mr. Stanton conceived the idea of appealing to 20 men throughout the state, most of them life-long friends, to save what he termed "the honor of Montana," meaning the heavyweight championship battle at Shelby.

"The committee authorizes me to announce," Mr. Stanton said, "that the \$100,000 due Jack Dempsey next Monday has been raised and will be in cash in the banks here not later than Saturday night. Much of it has been subscribed in cash from our loyal friends in Great Falls, but the amount subscribed in other cities of the State can not reach here before Saturday."

Charge Kearns Dodging.

"It is our opinion, judging from Kearns' attitude, that Kearns is not overly anxious to have Dempsey fight Gibbons and would get out of the fight if he could. Dempsey is under contract to fight Gibbons on July 4 and we are going to see that he does just that."
