TROUT PONDS IN OPERATION

WALLOWA, July 2. — 210,000 young trout are getting their start in life at the State Game Commission rearing ponds at Wallowa Lake. Four of the ponds have been completed, and six more will be put in later. The young brook trout are now about three-fourths of an inch long, and are feeling fine in the cold spring stream above the amusement grounds. In a short time 50,000 young yanks are expected to improve the stock of the Wallowa lake brood. The brook and few rainbow will go to stock the mountain lakes and streams.

The ponds are simply constructed by damming the stream that flows into Wallowa lake and partitioning the ponds with screens. It is hoped to continue the fish nursery next year, and possibly have a hatchery installed for this country. R. W. Miles and wife of Union have been in charge of the project since April 16th, and will probably remain until October. Mr. Miles feeds seven or eight pounds of ground liver to the prospective fry each day. He expects the fish to grow faster when the weather gets warmer.

INCLINE TO PROHIBITION.

(By the Associated Press.) STOCKHOLM, July 2.—Prohibition as a plank in the liberal platform, is responsible for a reduction in liberal party representation in the lower house of parliament from 116 members ten years ago to 29 at the present time.

At a recent extraordinary meeting of the liberal party this question was discussed, and after a long debate on the question whether or not to include prohibition in the party platform, 77 voted for and 56 against its inclusion.

CLEVELAND SALES CONTINUE STRONG

Records of the production department of the Cleveland Automobile Company indicate that the prediction made in April by Sid Black, Vice president of the company that May Cleveland Six sales would show a marked increase over those of the preceding month, was well founded.

"At the present time the factory is many hundreds of orders behind in production," is the advice given out by Smith & Press, local Cleveland Six distributor. "Every effort is being made to keep pace with numerous requests which are being received from dealers in every section for immediate delivery of cars."

"Of late, there has been considerable talk of rather calamity howling regarding the curtailment of production and working forces with a number of motor cars companies. Even if this condition does prevail with a few small manufacturers it does not apply generally throughout the industry."

"One has only to recall the pessimistic propaganda that was given out about a year ago in regard to the motor car to be able to discount much of what you hear. The industry is holding to many at that time was headed for the rocks; the public did not need more cars. Production figures since then indicate that the industry as a whole has passed through

an era of unprecedented prosperity. That this healthy state of business will continue is borne out by many men prominent in the industry. They are very optimistic regarding the future. At the rate Cleveland Six sales are going, officials of the company anticipate a good seasonal run of orders this summer with a resumption of increased business activity in the fall."

BERLIN HELPS RUSSIANS.

(By the Associated Press.) BERLIN, July 2.—Three military barracks in Berlin have been converted into dormitories for needy Russian students. The German Red Cross, the Russian section of the League of Nations, the Young Men's Christian

Association, and the European Students Union each contributed to the undertaking.

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FORDSON TRACTOR IS A LIFE SAVER IN THE CAUCASUS

"Ten American tractors ploughed a thousand acres of land in eleven days," the message said. "To accomplish the same work in the same time it would have required 1,000 oxen and 500 men."

Under power farming the crops in the Caucasus have been 50 per cent larger and one-third less seed has been used. When Armenia only a short time ago, with eighty per cent of its population engaged in agriculture, was only producing one-third of its cereal requirements, it is today producing about one-half with far less men employed in the work.

The Near East Relief is now using eleven Fordson Tractors.

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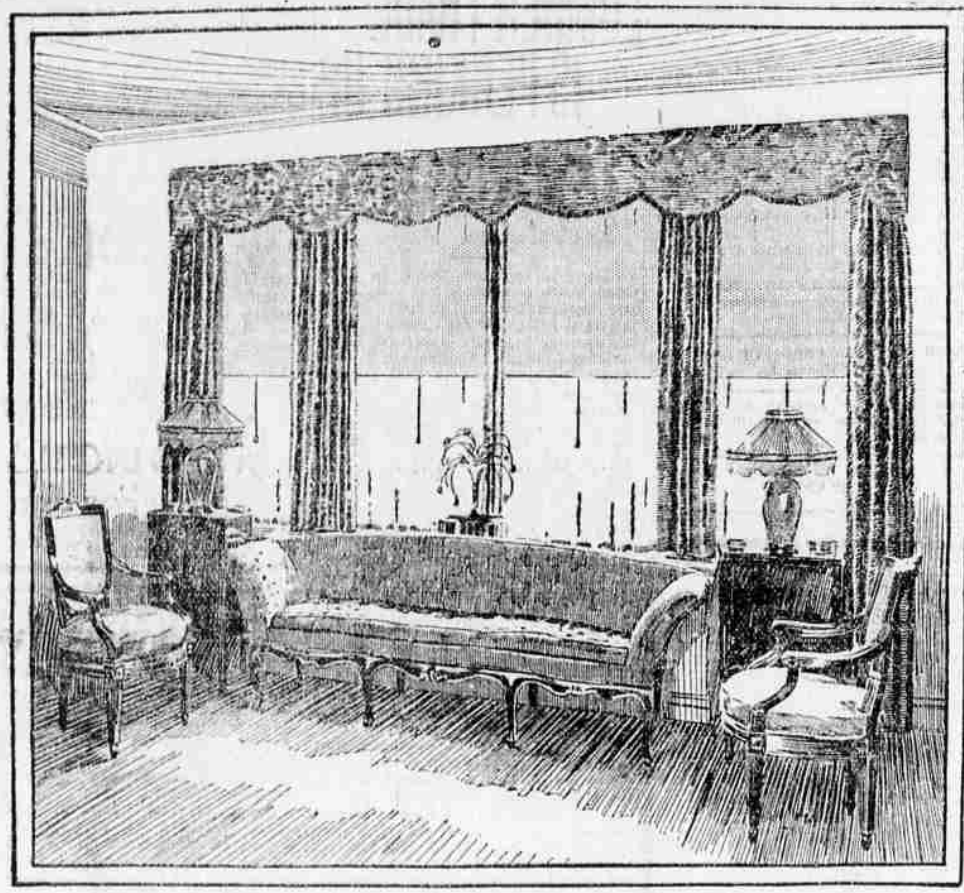
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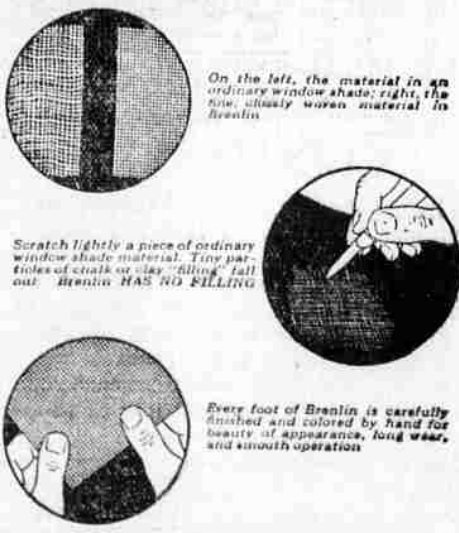
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
