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## FAMOUS CANYON TO BE SURVEYED

### State Geologist of Kansas to Seek Damsites for Flood Control.

LAWRENCE, Kan., July 3.—A trip through 400 miles of almost inaccessible canyon of the Colorado river as geologists for a government party is to be the summer vacation of Dr. R. C. Moore, state geologist of Kansas, and head of the department of geology at the University of Kansas. The party, under the leadership of Colonel Birdseye, director of the topographic division of the geological survey, is to leave Lee's Ferry, Arizona, about August 1, and expects to finish the survey by the middle of October.

The primary purpose of the survey, according to Doctor Moore, is to seek sites for dams for the control of the flood waters of the Colorado in the interests of irrigation, and to determine sites for the development of power.

Ten Persons in Party. This party is to consist of 10 persons. Colonel Birdseye is to be in charge, with Doctor Moore as geologist, assisted by two members of the federal bureau. In addition there will be five boatmen and a cook. Where swift currents does not make it impossible, frequent stops will be made for examination of the topographical and geological formations.

From Lee's Ferry to Needles, a distance of nearly 400 miles, the river has a fall of 2000 feet. Doctor Moore said while the general features were fairly well described by the Powell expedition of 1869-72, and the few expeditions that have been made since then, details are lacking and it is to supply the necessary information that the present trip is being made.

Assassin Escapes. CARACAS, Venezuela, July 3.—The assassins of Gen. Juan G. Gomez, first vice president of the republic, was characterized by congress as "without precedent in the annals of Venezuela." General Gomez, who was the brother of the president of Venezuela, was stabbed to death while in his bed in Miraflores palace early Saturday. The assassin, who is unidentified, apparently left no trace when he escaped. The funeral of General Gomez was held Sunday.

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## 17,306 FORD CARS SOLD DURING MAY

DETROIT, Mich., July 2.—Rates of cars and trucks in the United States for the month of May totaled 17,306 according to a report just issued by the Ford Motor company. The May sales were more than 4,500 greater than those of April, due to increased output.

Production has been the only limiting factor in the sales of Ford cars and trucks since January, for at all times orders on hand have been in excess of the manufacturing capacity of the company, great as it is.

The high production schedule which has been in effect the last few months, however, permitted May to show a gain of 44,213 units delivered over the corresponding month last year and it marks the first time in the entire month in which sales have gone above 100,000.

May deliveries bring the total of Ford sales in this country up to 722,850 cars and trucks for the five months from January 1 to June 1, an increase of 222,065 over the same months of 1922, and representing a 45 per cent increase over 1921.

Production records. Two new production records were established by the Ford Motor company during the week ending Tuesday, June 12th, the Ford News announces.

The total domestic output for the week was 49,140 Ford cars and trucks—732 more than the last high week, that ending May 29th with its total of 48,408.

Daily production went to a new high level Tuesday when the Ford assembly plants turned out 6,788 cars and trucks, or the record of 6,741 established on May 24th.

Fordson truck production for the week was 2,693.

The Lincoln division of the Ford Motor company produced 174 cars for the week ending Tuesday. Ford motor No. 7,777,777 was turned out at the Ford Motor company on June 5th and shipped on that date to the Los Angeles branch of the company.

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## ELLIS ISLAND PASSES ALIENS TO NEW HOMES

### More Than 1,000 Newly Arrived Immigrants Are Allowed to Land; Several Quotas Expected to Be Filled.

NEW YORK, July 3.—Ellis island, facing its greatest onslaught of immigrants since the enactment of the 3 per cent law by congress, was a place of happiness Sunday as would-be citizens with few exceptions were quickly processed into the United States.

Medical and immigration inspectors working until midnight started the streams of humanity taken to the island from four of the 11 ocean liners anchored at quarantine. More than 1000 of the 2974 aliens arriving at the island, it was estimated, were permitted to go to New York.

Quotas to be Filled Today. The quotas for various nationalities, which had limited the aliens as they sped across the ocean and waited aboard the ships to dash for quarantine on the stroke of midnight, were not reached during the day at Ellis island. Quotas for Greece and a number of persons who underwent examination Sunday either on ship board at Ellis island were 15,582. Of those 8711 were 2111 who must be examined at Ellis island and 6600 were members of the crews of the various vessels. The others were carried in passengers. Immigrants taken to the island Sunday were from the vessels that first cleared quarantine. They were in the following order: President Wilson, Italian, from Trieste, with 429 steerage passengers; Caribia, German, from Hamburg, with 1000 passengers; (New York) American, from New York, with 1000 passengers; and the ship Curran, who assumed office Sunday, said that 2243 immigrants would be taken to Ellis island Monday from the steamships Stockholm, Swedish, from Gothenburg; President Adams, American, from London; King Alce-

ander, British from Bremen and the France, from Havre.

Arrival of Vessels. The first vessel to arrive officially was the President Wilson which made quarantine directly after midnight, standard time. The Washington came next. Others in their order were the Canada, Polonia, King Alceander, Nieuw Amsterdam, France Stockholm, President Adams, Argentina and Giulio Cesare.

Fourteen stowaways were found aboard the Giulio Cesare. Four such hidden guests were found on the President Wilson.

Most of the best aboard the President Wilson was given away to passengers as the ship neared American waters. The rest was thrown overboard.

Sixteen of the 865 on board the Polonia were found suffering from contagious diseases and were isolated.

Egisto Rossi, commissioner general of immigration of the kingdom of Italy, was aboard the Giulio Cesare. On the President Wilson was Capt. R. A. Page, commissioner of immigration of Italy. The Italian officials hoped to observe the workings of the American quota laws.

Five hundred Hollanders were aboard the Nieuw Amsterdam. Many of them said they had acquired farms in the far and middle west, and asserted they intended to become American citizens.
