To Determine Actual Horsepower of Horse

DES MOINES, July 2.—Owners and users of grade and pure bred horses will have an opportunity at this year's Iowa State Fair to determine how much a team can pull through a series of scientific tests to be conducted under controlled conditions. The Horse Association of America, with headquarters at Chicago, will co-operative in the tests. A specially constructed wagon has been designed for the tests by the engineering department of Iowa State college. By means of gear and a hydraulic pump, driven from the wheels, it will be possible to put on any pre-determined load and maintain uniform load resistance from the test wagon, whether it travels on a level or up or down hill. The teams probably will be required to pull a six-horsepower load to enter, the load to be increased by two horsepower on each successive trial until the maximum is reached.

Whipping or shouting will disqualify an entry; all horses will be given a veterinary examination, and representatives of humane agencies will be present to forestall any charge of abuse.

"Horsepower has been a standard of power measurement for centuries, but little research work on the pulling powers of horses and mules has been carried on scientifically, because of the difficulty in providing uniform tractive resistance," said the management. "This we expect to determine."

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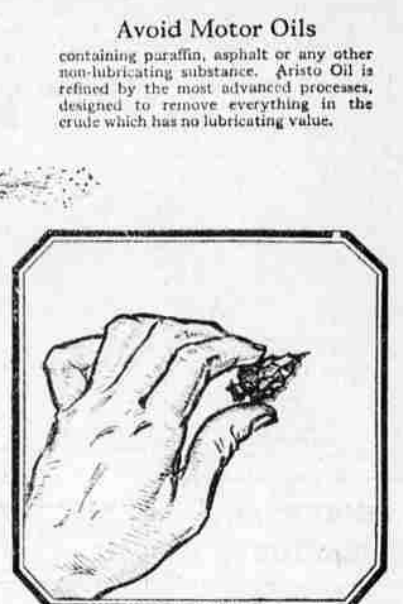
