Tea-time is Sandwich time

Tea and light sandwiches make a pleasant bracer to tide you over until the evening meal is served. Chat goes so well over the tea-cups that everywhere tea-time has come to be the most popular hour for informal friendly hospitality.

Make your tea sandwiches dainty both in size and kind, without crusts. Fillings should be smooth and delicate, preferably of lettuce and mayonnaise, watercress, chopped olives, minced chicken or turkey. Here is something new that will appeal:

Jelly Sandwiches: For the sweet sandwich which serves nicely for a dessert—use a r.m.a. lade, jam, jelly or a n.y. conserve not too liquid. Here's a suggestion: Spread buttered slices with currant jelly and sprinkle with chopped English walnut meats. T.E.M. crusts and cut slices in half, diagonally.

Savory Sandwiches: Blanch almonds, and brown one-half cup in cooking oil placed in a skillet. Chop fine. Season well with salt and paprika and add two tablespoons of chopped pickles and one tablespoon chopped chutney. Cream one large egg yolk and spread on thin slices of bread. Sprinkle with the almond mixture and press top slice of bread into place. Cut in triangle shapes.

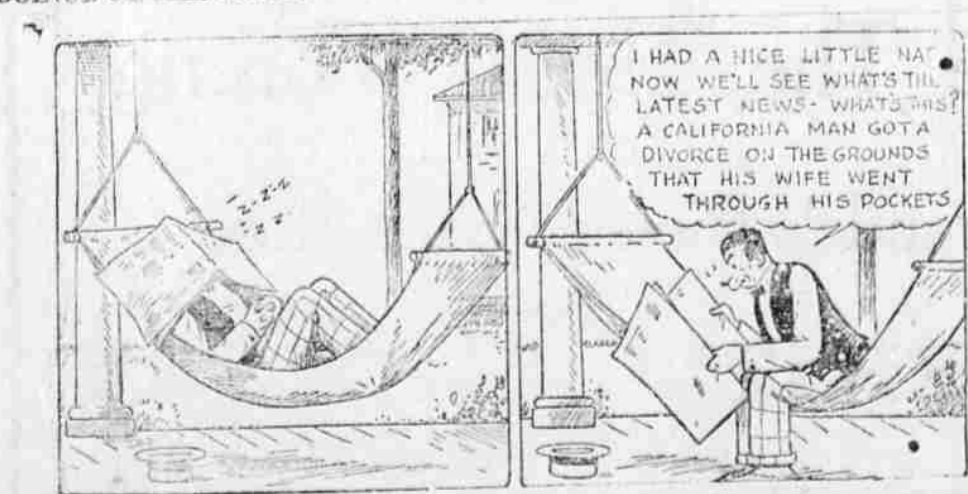

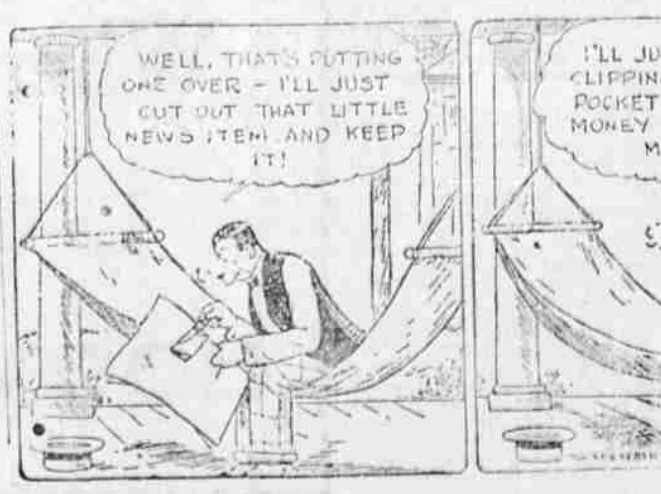

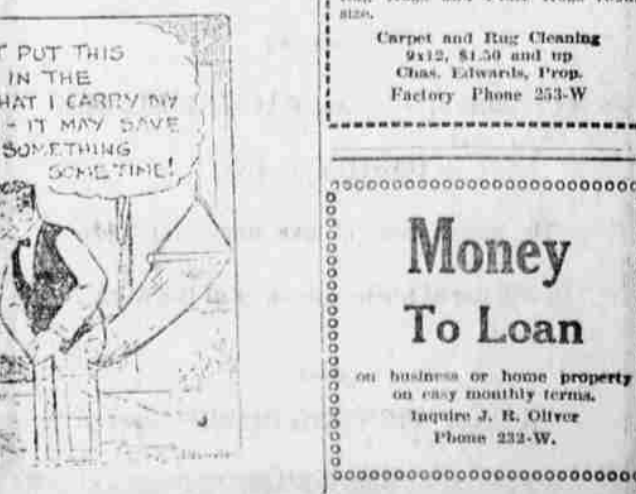
