ENGLAND AND RUSSIA LINKED.

(By the Associated Press) KOENIGSBERG, Germany, July 7.—Passengers may now fly from London to Moscow in sixteen and one-half hours of actual flying time. The air trip from London to Berlin takes eight hours. It requires four and one-half hours between Berlin and Koenigsberg, and the trip is made from here to Moscow in seven hours.

Passengers leave London, Wednesday morning, take a night train from Berlin to Koenigsberg, and continue with the airship leaving here every Thursday morning for Russia. The service is daily between London and Berlin, tri-weekly between Berlin and Koenigsberg and tri-weekly between Koenigsberg and Moscow.

NEW \$250,000 DEPOE. (By the Associated Press) GOLDEN, Utah, July 6.—Approximately \$250,000 will be expended for a new railroad depot here, it has been announced.

WALLOWA LAKE IS FULL TO DAM TOP

ENTERPRISE, July 7.—Wallowa is full to the top of the new dam, and the mountains have more than the normal depth of snow for this season. What seemed impossible six weeks ago has come to pass, caused by the continued rains of the second half of May and June.

At the beginning of the season, in early spring, the level of the lake was about three feet above the old natural level. The dam was closed and the water was conserved, but at the end of the first week in May the water had raised only 2 and a half feet, and therefore stood at 5 and a half feet above the level of the original outlet. On the corresponding day of 1922, the water was 15 feet above the low level.

The prospect early in May, therefore, was that the lake would not fill, as the snow was not deep in the mountains. Then the rains began in the valley, and snow fell in the mountains. No water was needed for irrigation and the level of the lake rose steadily and rapidly. The new dam raises the lake 21 feet above the original level, and that is where the water now stands.

Two years ago, when the new dam was first built, panic spread down the valley on the report that it had broken. Also it was reported that the ditch companies were letting out the water because they feared the dam would give way. The water is now at the same level as then and nobody thinks of alarm, as the dam is performing the very service it was built to render.

MEXICO TO REQUIRE INVOICE.

MEXICO CITY, July 7.—All parcel post shipments from foreign countries to Mexico must be accompanied by a commercial invoice, certified by the Mexican consular agent at the point of shipment, according to a recent government order. For a shipment less than \$5, the certification is free. From \$5 to \$50 the charge is \$1 and from \$50 upward the charge is \$2. Shipments arriving without an invoice will result in a fine being imposed of 25 centavos for goods valued at less than 100 pesos, and 50 centavos for those valued at more than 100 pesos.
