Pirate Decks Are Cleared For Action

Baker to Be Met With a Dozen Mean Diamond Artists Tomorrow When They Invade La Grande.

When the Colts come galloping to La Grande tomorrow with blood in their eye and determination written over their physiognomies in bold face, they will be met with a reception committee of heavy hitters, who promise to more than make up for the lack of effectiveness those bats found against Baker this last time the Pirates and Colts clashed. The last game between Baker and La Grande was one of the best exhibitions of baseball ever witnessed in Eastern Oregon and if both teams only play one half as good this Sunday, it will be a game well worth every man's time to attend.

Both teams are going into the game with a lot at stake. If either loses the pennant fades and in addition the Pirates are out for revenge. The Colts kicked them in the face not long ago with a flock of goose eggs and the Pirates have their cutlasses and black flag out ready to do battle.

The game will be played at the fair grounds and will start at approximately 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. All children under 12 years will not be charged admittance.

Crews is still in doubt as to just who he will play against Baker. For the first time this year La Grande has an over-supply (that is more than the conventional nine) of baseball artists to choose from and picking a lineup today seemed just a bit "too soon." With four pitchers, and eight other players to make the selection from, it isn't such a small job to line 'em up. But there is going to be a lot of classy Pirates out in uniform tomorrow—plenty of players, plenty of pinch hitters, and plenty of pitchers. What more could you want?

When Cove played their last game here the largest crowd of the year was out—but tomorrow is expected to smash that record in bits.

Clifford, an infielder who formerly played with Elgin and was in the Portland city league last year, now at Frairie City, will also be added to the Pirates lineup Sunday. In addition to being a bang-up player, Clifford swats a mean ball and should add considerable strength to the La Grande stickers.

SETS MARATHON GOLF MARK.

CLEVELAND, July 7.—Rudolph Supan, 21-year-old veteran of the World war, established a new marathon golf record of 237 holes on the Highland park course here Friday. Starting at 1:20 o'clock Friday morning, Supan played until darkness, breaking the former record of 223 holes recently established by N. J. Morris at San Antonio, Tex.

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Don't Let Business Interfere With Golf, Is Advice of Doctor

NEW YORK, July 7.—If golf interferes with business, drop business, is the advice given by Dr. F. P. Millard of Toronto, Canada, at the annual convention of the American Osteopathic association.

"Dropping business now and then is a good way to make the business grow and to have some fun with it besides," Doctor Millard said in an address. "Golf is a thoroughly osteopathic game, and no one getting on toward middle age, with a tendency to stiffness of the spine or creakiness of the joints, can fail to benefit by it. Take the swing of the clubs. Consider how it limbers up the spine. As for the effect on the wrist, it's marvelous.

"The golfer draws upon a different set of muscles than the tennis player. The 300-yard drive of the golfer can only be made when the wrist motion is perfect. The wrists of the professional golfers are taken care of daily, and special exercises are prescribed which would benefit any golfer, for the wrists tend to stiffen between games and should always be limbered up before starting a game."

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DEMPSEY TAKES VACATION.

GREAT FALLS, July 7.—Jack Dempsey world heavyweight champion Thursday night is starting out for a few days' vacation after a confining nine weeks training grind. The title holder accompanied by his father, his faithful little trainer and a Chicago detective left for Salt Lake City, Utah to visit his mother before proceeding to Los Angeles.

The champion expects to begin training in New York by August 1 for a bout with Harry Wells or the winner of the Willard-Firpo contest.

WIMBLEDON, July 7.—William M. Johnston, of San Francisco, today won the world's grass court tennis championship, defeating Francis T. Hunter, of New Rochelle, New York, in the finals of the Wimbledon tournament.

FIGHTERS READY.
NEW YORK, July 7.—Jess Willard and Luis Angel Firpo, who will battle in a 12-round match at Boyle's 30 Acres next Thursday night, are close to their best fighting edge. Both plan but a few days more of strenuous work before tapering off, Willard in his gymnasium quarters at Yonkers and the South American in his camp at Long Branch, N. J.

Willard has lost six pounds in the past two weeks' training, tipping the scales at 240 after 11 rounds of fast ring work Thursday. His present weight is eight pounds below the figure he scored when he knocked out Floyd Johnson two months ago.

Firpo, though in fighting trim as a result of a trip to Cuba and Mexico, has not slackened his program of conditioning at Long Branch. After a road run and private workout Thursday under the direction of Jimmy De Forrest, his trainer, Firpo went four rounds each with Jack McAuliffe and Bill Tate, his sparring mates.

LENGLEN AGAIN WINS TITLE.

WIMBLEDON, July 7.—Suzanne Lenglen still is supreme among all women tennis players of the world. With ease and certainty the French star Friday afternoon defeated Miss Kathleen McKane, the best of Britain's tennis playing women, by a score of 6-2, 6-2, and so won for the fifth successive season the title of world's champion. It was the first meeting between these stars and with one exception it was the worst beating Suzanne has administered to the lively British girl.

Miss Lenglen had the battle in hand from start to finish.

WANT CAMP GROUNDS BESIDE HIGHWAYS

ENTERPRISE, July 7.—Three camping spots in Wallowa canyon are to be provided by the county court, as a starter in a move to make the roads of the country more inviting to automobile tourists. Before the highway was built through the canyon, cars could turn off the old road almost anywhere, and stop at pretty spots beside the river and in the shadow of the timbered hills. The highway, with its carefully built-up grade, makes the lower ground inaccessible in the main.

A little filling, however, will give an easy and safe driveway down to the green turf beside the river and to beautiful camping spots.

Further up on the highway the court hopes to be able to locate stopping places for tourists. Near Gwynne there is a chance for camp grounds, with shade and the river to make the place inviting. Farmers in the neighborhood will be asked to cooperate, and they will have an opportunity to carry on a small business in food, with travelers.
