SHERRY'S LAST DAY

THRILLING FILM MADE FROM STAGE PLAY

"The Little Church Around the Corner," featuring Claire Windsor, opened yesterday at the Sherry's Theatre, and lost no time in establishing itself in the minds and hearts of the appreciative audience as a picture with a double-barrelled punch—a picture thoroughly enjoyed by all who saw it, and one that certainly will be voted one of the most powerful screen dramas ever seen here. Better pictures may be made in the future, perhaps, but nothing like it for brisk action and movement that makes you hold your breath has yet been presented.

This adaptation of Charles Hane's play is packed with thrills from start to finish. There is a mob scene in a mining town in which a stormy crowd of strikers attack a mine owner. That is dramatically portrayed; in fact, it is no use to pick out one scene and say it is better than any other; a uniform excellence of high quality is maintained throughout, and our advice to everybody on the lookout for good entertainment is to see this one.

It is said that to make the mining scene, a real town had to be built, a street of houses erected and a mine costing \$25,000 installed. One can easily believe that for the scene in the picture would lead one to suppose that they had been taken in some Pennsylvania town.

"The Little Church Around the Corner," tells of young David Graham, a minister hailing from a little mining town. He gets a place in a fine church of another city and there falls in love with Lella Morton, daughter of the wealthy mine owner. Tense situations arise after a strike is called and David is torn between love for his oppressed workers, and for his sweetheart. A great miracle performed by Graham softens the fiery heart of Morton, and all is about to end—when the young minister is suddenly arrested for the murder of a wealthy miner for Lella's hand. The prison scenes are exciting.

Kindergarten Sandwiches

They make every lunch a "surprise." With some fancy-shaped cutters in the kitchen and this recipe your boy will eat his way to racy cheeks and stalwart health, and find delight in every bite:

Cut white Bread and dark graham Bread in thin slices. Shape with cutters having two pieces each of white and of graham Bread of the same shape. Lightly spread half of the Bread, with well creamed butter. With smaller fancy shaped cutters, remove centers from unbuttered graham and white pieces. Place graham Bread centers in white Bread rims and white Bread centers in graham Bread rims. Place decorated pieces with white rim on the corresponding piece of graham Bread and the decorated pieces with graham rim on corresponding piece of white Bread. For a variety use cutters that are square, oblong, triangular, elliptical, fluted or other shapes. For the centers use tiny rounds, or animal, flower, or other fancy shaped cutters. A circle of dark and one of white Bread may be cut diagonally three times and one-half the sections of each color to put together alternately on a plain circle of bread. Add a juicy orange or rosy apple, and you have a hearty, well-balanced lunch.
