Golf Dream "Comes True"

Joe Kirkwood Turns in Perfect Score at Inwood After Dreaming of Such During Night.

INWOOD, N. Y., July 11.—All Monday night, Joe Kirkwood, a droll sort of fellow from Tuxedo, dreamed of his stroke. He stroked across green fairways driving little white balls with deadly accuracy. On the greens, he sank long putts. Some times he encountered traps, but pitched from them close to the cups. Just before seven last Tuesday morning, he walked across adjoining beds into the Inwood club territory, dreaming he was pushing his way through a large cheering gallery.

The dream came true Tuesday in the second qualifying round for the national open championship. With Jess Sweetser, amateur champion, for a partner, Kirkwood played a perfect game on his two trips around the course, turning in a card of 144. He was around in the morning in 70, two under par, and his afternoon card was 74, two above. He was 10 strokes better than any other of the 200 who finished within the limit of 159 to qualify.

Three of the 19 amateurs who played Tuesday with the married brigade qualified. Jess Sweetser, made the grade, as did Francis Olmsted of Boston and Alexander Armour of Ives, N. Y.

Gets World Records.

GOTHENBURG, July 11.—Arne Berg, the Swedish swimming star, set two new world records at the international athletic games here, covering 1000 meters in 14 minutes, 14 4-10 seconds, thereby beating his previous time of 14 minutes, 17 8-10 seconds, and swimming 1500 meters in 21 minutes, 25 5-10 seconds, as against the previous record of 22 minutes flat held by George Holison of Canada.

Kilbane, With \$250,000 To Plow Business Field

CLEVELAND, July 11.—After nearly a month's rest on a farm near Vermilion, J. Kilbane, world's featherweight boxing champion until he met Eugene Celmi in New York, is ready to settle down to the life of a business man. His friends have estimated his financial assets at a quarter of a million dollars.

Johnny will become a business man without any regrets at having lost the title, although, as he says now, he regrets when he staggered to his feet immediately following his knockout. "No more fighting for me," Johnny has said. "I can't fight any more, anyway. The old pep was gone in the great fight, my hands were bad, I had nothing. And to meet a little fighter of Celmi's type you needed everything."

"I have appreciated the way my friends rallied about me after I had been beaten. When I returned to Cleveland 11 years ago after being knocked out for the championship, 100,000 people met me at the depot. A few hundred of my friends met me when I returned from Cripple fight. They were downcast, but I want them to know that I am not at all blue; that I'm glad I'm no longer champion."

Johnny says his only interest in boxing in the future will be centered in Al Ziemer, his sparring partner for years, when he wants to send after Cripple.
