VERMONT SOLON CALLED BEYOND

MONTPELIER, Vt., July 14.—William H. Dillingham, United States senator from Vermont since 1909, chairman of the senate committee on privileges and elections, died at a hospital here late Thursday night. The senator, who was in his 80th year, failed to rally from an operation performed three weeks ago. Vice President Coolidge and a senate committee are expected to attend the funeral at the Methodist Episcopal church in Waterbury, Senator Dillingham's native town, Sunday afternoon.

Served As Governor.
Son of a governor of Vermont, Mr. Dillingham also served one term as governor just before entering the senate. He had previously held state and county offices and served in both branches of the Vermont legislature. He was a trustee of the University of Vermont and Governor of the Vermont Society of Colonial Wars. Although he never attended college, he received honorary degrees from the University of Vermont, Norwich University and Middlebury University.

Hundred Ounce Silver Found In Rex Claim

BAKER, July 14.—Everybody knows Susanville as a mining camp. The people of that section all work at mining. The district has produced millions in wealth, but in recent years along with other mining sections the production has dropped off and there has not been as much doing in the mines. This, however, has not dampened the ardor of those remaining in the district, and today everybody is working and good showings are resulting.

Some months ago the Hunter Brothers made a new discovery in Elk Creek at Susanville, which they have named the Rex, that has attracted much attention. The ore runs high in silver values, and they now have on the dump 60 tons of ore averaging 1000 ounces to the ton which they will ship to the smelter at Sumpter. The ore has been taken out in sinking 30 feet. The work completed has not disclosed the extent of the ore and there is every indication that they have a large body of it in the shipping grade as well as milling ore. The shipping ore is about two feet wide and is being sent to the smelter without sorting.

ROAD CONDITIONS IN EASTERN OREGON

The weekly report of the State Highway Commission as to the conditions of the highways in the eastern part of Oregon is as follows:

Baker-Louis Highway.
Road over Insley Mountain now open. Fair county road.

La Grande-Joseph Highway.
La Grande-Island City: Paved. Island City-Alice: Excellent macadam.

Alice-Imbler: New grade in fair condition.

Imbler-Elgin: Old road over hill very rough but passable.

Elgin-Minam-Lostine: Macadamized and in excellent condition.

Lostine-Enterprise: Under construction; turn off at Wade's Crossing and take hill road to Enterprise.

Enterprise-Joseph: Excellent macadam.

Joseph-Wallowa Lake: Good condition.

Baker-Cornucopia Highway.
Baker-Halfway: 12 miles macadam, 21 miles graded roadbed. Balance fair county road. New grade on lower Powder River between Love Bridge and Black Bridge now open to traffic.

Oregon-Washington Highway.
Pendleton-Washington State Line: Paved.

Pendleton-Pilot Rock: 5 miles good earth road; 10 miles macadam.

Pilot Rock-Vinson: 15.7 miles macadam in good condition.

Vinson-Butter Creek-James Hill: County road. Very rough and rocky but passable.

James Hill-Heppner: Standard grade in good condition. Under contract for macadamizing.

Heppner-Heppner Junction (junction of Columbia River Highway): Macadamized and in excellent condition.

Old Oregon Trail-East of The Dalles: Meacham-Headman's Pass: Approximately five miles of the distance between these points is unimproved but in very good condition.

Ontario-Huntington-La Grande-Baker-Meacham: Macadamized entire distance and in excellent condition.

Headman's Pass-Pendleton: Excellent macadam.

Pendleton-Umatilla-Arlington-The Dalles: Macadamized entire distance.

Old Oregon Trail-West of The Dalles: The Dalles-Mosier-Hood River-Cascade Locks-Portland: Paved entire distance.

Portland-Seppois-Deer Island-Hunter-Catskanie-Astoria-Seaside: Paved.

entire distance except for one mile through city of Rainier where paving operations are underway. Take detour over old macadamized road one block south of highway.

BRITISH EXPORTS TO BRAZIL.
(By the Associated Press)
RIO DE JANEIRO, July 14.—American exports to Brazil, according to figures published by the federal department of commercial statistics, were surpassed by British shipments last year for the first time since the beginning of the world war. The total value of American exports to that country in 1922 was almost equal to that of the year before hostilities began in Europe, but less than one-quarter of the total reached in the high tide year of 1920.

The reasons for this tremendous decrease in Brazilian imports of American products, according to opinions expressed by business representatives here, are the unfavorable exchange rates on Brazilian money, the relatively higher cost of doing business confronting American exporters, and the general retrenchment in Brazil.
