# FRUIT AND HAY RAISERS HAPPY

### No Scarcity of Labor, Which Was Anticipated Some Time Ago, Felt; Workers Prove Numerous.

What are the cherry men and hay farmers singing now? "Everybody happy? Yes, do." The reason for the above query and answer, which may be turned loose on the Grande Ronde valley air rhythmically, is that, with both the cherry and hay harvest coinciding, a scarcity of workers is not felt in the least. In fact, to the contrary, cherry men and hay farmers have both turned down applications for jobs during the harvest.

The reason for the plentiful supply of labor at present is due to the fact that the tourists, who are passing through this country, are many of them stopping off and aiding in the harvest—in a way, working their way along the highway. Thus the migratory help is giving the fruit and hay raisers all the help they need and no difficulty in picking and packing cherries and putting up the hay which was expected a short time ago, is felt.

**Harvest Time is Gay.**  
Especially in Cove, where hundreds are gathered cleaning the cherries, the harvest time is proving a gala affair—socially, financially and in every other way. During this time of the year camps are established and in fact Cove becomes two separate communities, the regular city and the tent city.
