## DOUKHOBORS LOOK FOR MILD CLIMATE

**WINNIPEG, Man., July 14.**—Vegetarianism and the rigors of Saskatchewan winters are not compatible, at least in the experience of the Doukhobors, a religious sect which is planning to migrate to a climate whose winter months can better be withstood without the aid of animal furs.

Peter Verigin, whose official position with the Doukhobors is president of the Christian Community of Universal Brotherhood, Limited, of Verigin, Saskatchewan, is authority for the statement that the vegetarians have found the Saskatchewan province winters too rigorous to be withstood on their diet.

Verigin and E. Caskoff, manager of the Doukhobor community, have gone east in search of a suitable tract, probably in the fruit lands of the province of Ontario, on which to locate their followers.

The leaders believe that the next settlement of the Doukhobors, after they have disposed of their Saskatchewan property, will be in the vicinity of the Niagara peninsula, where a jam making industry probably will be established, such as has been successfully operated by Doukhobors at Brilliant, E. C.

Verigin pointed out that persons who eat meat, perhaps use stimulants, and find solace in smoking, had found Saskatchewan's climate suitable, but that vegetarianism was one of the important features of the Doukhobor creed, and not to be altered because of climatic conditions. The migration will affect 1,500 persons.

## FINDS OPIUM TRAFFIC HEAVY

**LONDON, July 14.**—China is producing hundreds of tons of opium, says Sir John Jordan, British Minister in Peking, and it looks as though she were going back to the old, bad state of affairs before the suppression of opium by agreement with India was brought about. India, the British Minister adds used to export about 100,000 chests of opium a year, mostly to China; now her exports are only 5,000 chests, almost exclusively to the East Indies. She is prepared to reduce this if there is a reduced consumption.

## WILD STORM HITS BEND, WEST OREGON

**BEND, Or., July 13.**—Ushered in by violent thunder and lightning, and a crashing of hail, the heaviest storm on record here swept Bend for half an hour this afternoon. In that time, six-tenths of an inch of rain fell, pouring in torrents off roofs and flooding streets and sewers.

On the paved streets water rose over the curbs, the flood swelled by regurgitation from storm sewers, and in several stores the floors were covered with water. Merchants piled brooms hastily, one being driven to hole holes in the floor of his establishment to carry off the excess. Floors at the municipal bathing rack stood ankle deep in water when the storm was at its height.

**Unusual Storm.**  
**ROSEBURG, Or., July 11.**—The Umpqua valley experienced an unusual storm this morning when residents were awakened by heavy peals of thunder and a downpour of rain. Thunder storms are infrequent in this valley, but a morning storm of this nature is a great rarity and occasioned a great deal of comment. The local weather bureau observer said fifteen-hundredths of an inch of rain fell during a 20-minute period. The rainfall for the month is almost twice the normal.
