Walla Walla Wins Pennant

PENDELTON, July 16.—Before 5000 persons, the largest crowd that ever saw a ball game in Pendleton, Walla Walla won from the Buckaroos here Sunday afternoon by a score of 6 to 5, and by the victory took the pennant of the Blue Mountain league. The game was a post-season contest to break the tie between the two teams.
Neither team scored until the fourth, when the visitors got one and Pendleton two. In the sixth each team added two more. Walla Walla came back in the eighth for two more, leaving the score tied. Walla Walla drew blood again in the ninth with one more marker. The Buckaroos in their play, with the bases full, were retired when Baker flew out.
Bobby Jones Wins Open Golf Title
INWOOD, July 16.—Robert (Bobby) Jones, Jr., a sun burned boy from Dixie, became the open golf champion of America Sunday, defeating Robert Allen Cruikshank, Scotch professional of the Chickamauxon Country club, Westfield, N. J., by two strokes, in the play off of a tie that existed Saturday at the end of the regular 72-hole championship round. Jones took 78 and Cruikshank 75. Jones, amateur of Atlanta, Ga., came into the title, he had long sought on the 18th and very last hole, ending one of the most dramatic contests in a quarter of a century of American title history. In the long winning battle the Georgian was pitted against another golfer, a great fighter and a sportsman. Robert Allen Cruikshank was a loser. Both the Georgian and Scot, at the end of the rounds Saturday in which 77 golfers competed, were tied with 296 strokes. That tie came into being on the 18th green.
Thrilling enough as far as the 17th hole, where the Scot with a remarkable recovery from a trap and a four foot put, squared the match, the play off developed unexpected elements on the last hole.
The southern boy needed to hole his put for a birdie, and two putts would put his down in four, almost certainly enough to win. But Cruikshank had a chance to tie, slim as it was, if he could pitch to the pin and hole his putt, Jones would need the birdie to win.
Scot Studied Lay.
The Scot studied almost every inch of the ground up the cup, smiled, set himself and shot. His ball hit the green, but rolled into a shallow trap to the left. He had to hole from there by his certain of defeat. Again he studied the terrain, and again he smiled and shot. The ball overran the cup 15 feet. There was not a

chance of a chance left, but he pulled and missed.
Then he walked to Jones to congratulate him, signifying that he conceded defeat. But Jones elected to put it out. The Atlantan played safe, rolling his ball to the edge of the cup and sinking it in four.
