With the machines now being utilized for harvesting, practically all of this grain can be saved.

"Only the smaller area planted has stopped the coarse grains from showing a bumper production this season. While the crop per acre is about as heavy as ever before known in the Pacific Northwest the area sown is extremely limited.

Shortage of Timothy.
"There is a shortage of timothy hay in Eastern Oregon, due to the extended cool weather. While such weather was excellent for wheat and thoroughly filled the heads, it retarded the growth of hay, especially timothy. The first cutting of alfalfa was generally below the average for this same season, but there is every indication that the second cutting will be sufficient to make up for most, if not all, of the deficiency."

ELECTION IN MINNESOTA IS ONE OF HEAT

Record Vote Being Polled; Race is Between Harding and LaFollette Followers.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 16.—Minnesota's electorate in today's senatorial election, is polling the state far in excess of the 200,000 cast in the June primary, reports at noon from representative counties indicated.

The total votes cast may exceed 500,000, as compared to 500,000 eligible voters in the state.

The fight is mainly between Governor Pross, republican and a Harding adherent, and Magnus Johnson, farmer-laborite, a follower of Robert M. LaFollette.

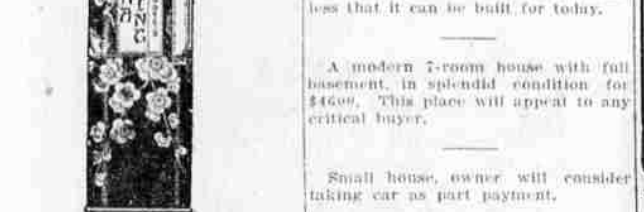
The supporters of the third candidate, James A. Carley, democrat, counted him out even before the polls opened.
