RED WILLIAMS HAPPY AS LARK

In the Car "Redwing" He Entered at the Boise Auto Races.

HEARINGS TO BE HELD REGARDING INCOME TAX UNIT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, was today advised that early this fall, the date to be announced later, a subcommittee from the bureau of internal revenue, Washington, D. C., will hold a series of hearings in Portland when residents of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Wyoming may present appeals from the action of the income tax unit.

The purpose of these hearings in the field is to afford taxpayers of the Pacific Northwest states, who can only appear before the bureau at Washington at the cost of considerable time and expense, an opportunity to present their cases on appeal before an appellate body of the bureau sitting in the appellant's own locality. All evidence, considered in cases heard upon appeal must have been previously submitted to the income tax unit in accordance with the established practice of the bureau.

This plan of affording the taxpayer this less expensive method of presenting his appeal in income tax matters was initiated by the bureau as an experiment with a series of hearings at St. Paul, Minnesota, beginning late in April. The result of the work of the subcommittee at the point was so successful that the bureau felt justified in continuing these hearings in the more remote middle west and Pacific Coast districts. Leaving St. Paul, the subcommittee will hold similar hearings at Los Angeles, beginning August 1st, for the accommodation of residents of the states of California, Nevada, Utah and Arizona, before coming to Portland for further hearings.

"By this arrangement," said Collector Huntley today, "the work of hearing and disposing of these appeals from taxpayers will not only be greatly expedited but the interested appellants will be spared the expense and loss of time of either going to Washington in person or employing legal assistance to make the trip to that city where all appeals have heretofore been heard."

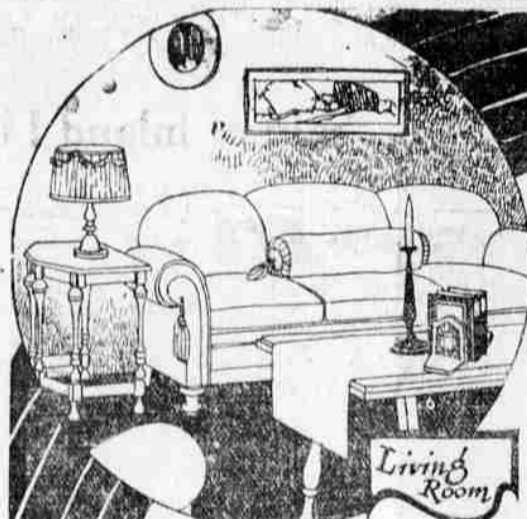

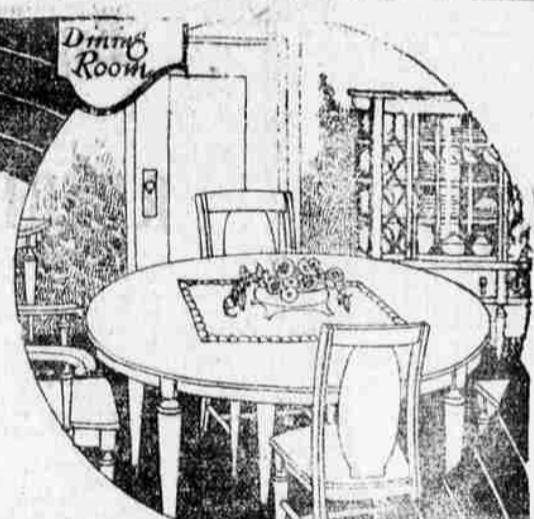

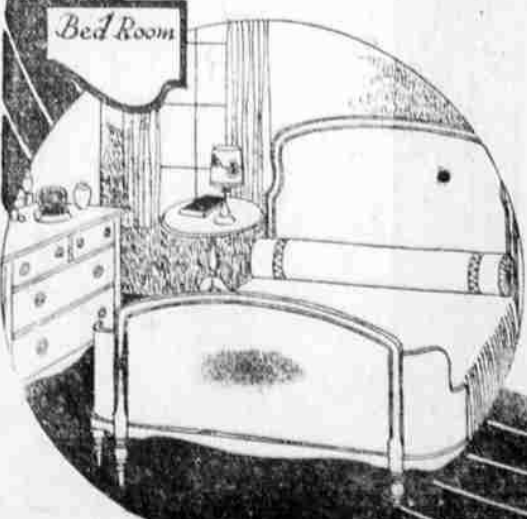
