Typhoid's Low Death Rate. (City Associated Press)

NEW YORK, July 17.—Control of typhoid fever has made such progress that in 1922 the death rate for this disease was the lowest ever recorded, according to figures compiled by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

Based on statistics from one-seventh of the total population of the United States and Canada, the death rate in the year mentioned was 5.6 per 100,000 of population. In 1911 the rate was 22.8 per 100,000. These figures are particularly

cheering to the American Child Health Association, which is engaged in fighting typhoid as well as other diseases which affect children and mothers.

280 Hours in Air. (City Associated Press)

LISBON, June 25.—Colonel Saccadura Cabral, one of the Portuguese aviators who flew from Lisbon to Rio de Janeiro, referring recently to his project of flying

around the world, said his itinerary would be divided into three parts. The first would be from Lisbon to Japan, 9,870 miles; second, Japan to Newfoundland, 7,580 miles; third, Newfoundland to Lisbon by way of Fayal and Ponta Delgada, 2,140 miles.

On the basis of an average speed of 70 miles an hour, the aviator would expect to spend 280 hours in the air.
