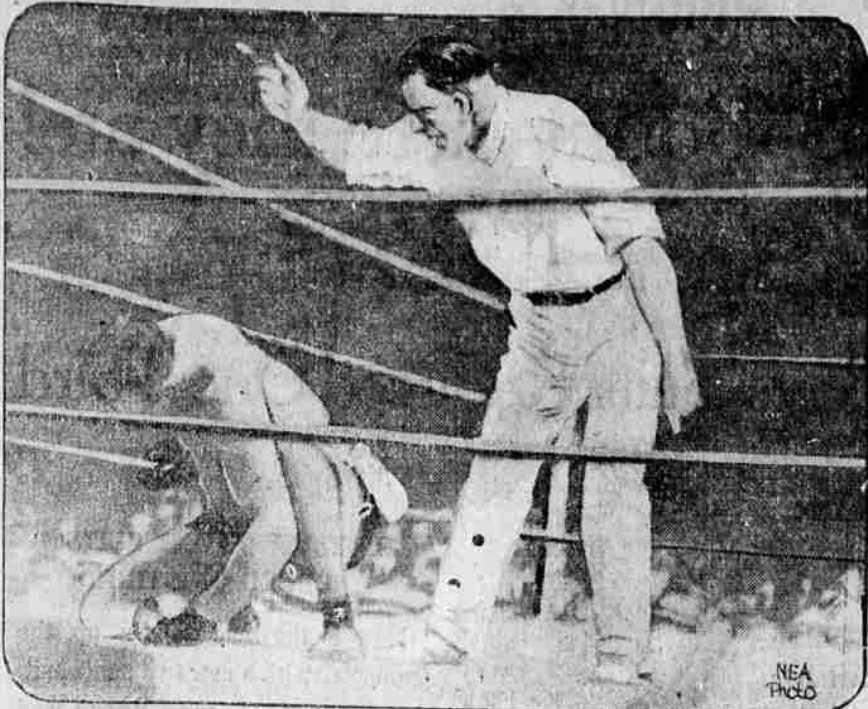


LUIS FIRPO K. O.'s WILLARD



This extraordinary photograph, taken under the difficult conditions of night, shows Jess Willard, former heavyweight champion of the world, taking the count of ten at the hands of Luis Angel Firpo, Argentine giant, in the eighth round of a battle staged at Boyle's Thirty Acres, Jersey City, N. J. One hundred thousand people saw Firpo knock out Willard with a terrific right to the jaw Thursday night, July 12. The picture shows Willard on one knee as Referee Harry Lewis counted him out.

5 La Grande Men Batting Above .300

Team Batted at Par Against Cove Sunday; MaGee Falls from Leadership.

Red Alexander boasted several batting averages on the La Grande team when he allowed the Pirates six hits Sunday. He left Hoskins, catcher, setting pretty with four times at bat and two hits, giving him a percentage of .500. Rosenbaum raised his percentage from .468 to .374, a total of 3 points. Tex Knight gained one point, coming up from .242 to .243. Clifford jumped from the goose egg column to .143 and Buck Knight gained .20 points. Beck was at bat two times and got one hit, hitting .500 for the day.

Incidentally, while the above mentioned players raised their averages, several others dropped quite a bit. Mattie fell from leadership, which he has maintained for several weeks, coming down from .447 to .368. McInnis fell from .416 to .355. Crews dropped from .290 to .193. White fell from .230 to .200, etc.

Cove Hit Weakly. Cove, reputed to have some of the strongest hitters in the league, slanted the ball hard but as far as hits went, they did very little. As a team they totaled 121 Sunday, being at bat 32 times and getting but four hits. On the other hand, the La Grande

Harvest Wages Raised. VANCOUVER, Wash., July 17.—Wages of workers in Clarke county prime orchards for the coming harvest have been fixed by the directors of the Washington Growers' Packing corporation, which is the sales organization of the Clarke county association of prime growers. The wage scale is higher than last year, although the rate to pickers remains the same. Pickers will receive 6 cents a box and if they remain throughout the season will get a 2-cent bonus. Kinney will get 45 a day this fall. Laborers, including dippers, haulers and shakers, will get \$3.50 for a 10-hour day and a 50 cent a day bonus for remaining through the season. Last year they received but \$2 a day.
