DECREASE IS SEEN IN GRAIN EXPORTS

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Grain exports from American ports last week amounted to 3,813,000 bushels, compared with 4,627,000 bushels the week before.

Figures made public Monday by the commerce department show the following comparisons of grain exports this week with those of the week before:

Barley, 238,000 bushels, against 182,000 bushels; corn, 204,000, against 207,000; oats, 63,000, against 41,000; rye, 52,000, against 1,481,000; wheat, 2,418,000, against 2,216,000; flour, 151,200 barrels, against 135,600 barrels.

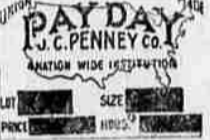
