KLAN MAY MEET AT PORTLAND

ASHEVILLE, N. C., July 19.—General Nathan Bedford Forrest, grand dragon of the famous confederate cavalry leader of the same name and head of the Ku Klux Klan in this state, is expected to arrive in Portland during the week between the states and the reconstruction period, addressed the conference of grand dragons and great titans now in session here Wednesday on "The Original Ku Klux Klan."

No place for the next annual convention of state officers will be selected at this meeting, this being left to imperial officers, although Denver, Colo., Portland, Ore., and Indianapolis, Ind., have extended invitations, officials stated. Reports of committees today will end the convention.

Indorsement and support of the women of the Ku Klux Klan, a kin-little Rock, Ark., were given unanimous vote.

Among the subjects and speakers at yesterday's session was Fred L. Gifford, grand dragon of realm of Oregon, speaking on "The Responsibility of Klan Craft to the American Boy," speaking of a children's home being financed and built by klansmen of Oregon.

ing the Maine had been blown up by hostile Spaniards.

"Suspend judgment," urged Sigbee in his first report. His calm wisdom did much to prevent the United States from rushing into war immediately. He accompanied the court of inquiry in its investigation of the wreck, and his expert knowledge helped it to arrive at a decision as to the cause of the disaster.

"The question has been asked many times," said the Admiral years after the tragedy, "whether I believed then that the Maine was blown up from the outside. My answer has been that my first order on reaching the dock was to post sentries to repel boarders."

Admiral Sigbee added fresh laurels to his fame in the war that soon followed the disaster. As commander of the St. Paul, a transatlantic liner converted into an auxiliary cruiser, he captured the Spanish collier Restormiel, carrying coal to Cervera, and thus sealed the fate of the Spanish fleet at Santiago. The cruiser Isabella II and the destroyer Terror both hauled down their flags and surrendered to him.

Naval Career Began Early.

The naval career of Sigbee began when he was a boy of 14 years. Born in Albany, N. Y., in 1845, he entered Annapolis in 1859 and was graduated four years later. He was assigned to the West Gulf Squadron, and at the age of 19 was following Admiral Farragut as an ensign
