FINANCING THE COW IS OBJECT

In order to prove to farmers that the new Oregon-Idaho Dairy Financing corporation, which is backed by the government, is to work a full hundred per cent, C. E. Wharton, of Portland, spent yesterday in the city talking with prominent people among whom were a number of farmers. "I tell you the cow is the safe bet," said Mr. Wharton, "we can do this and that but the cow is the ready money every day. The nation is coming to this realization and the only way to pay the heavy expenses of today on the farm and lift the indebtedness is the dairy cow. Our institution is organized to finance the cows and we believe the Grande Ronde valley is the fine place for a lot of dairy cows. Congressman Pat McArthur, who was here a few days ago, returned to Portland with the statement that this valley is one of the very safest places for us to operate. He is interested in the corporation and we are getting ready to do some business in this valley."

POWDER STORE IS BURGLARIZED

According to reports received here two men were arrested late yesterday in Baker and were being held, suspected of being implicated in the North Powder store robbery.

NORTH POWDER, July 20.—This town was visited by burglars Wednesday. Some time after 11 p. m., the Hutchinson & Forstrom general merchandise store was broken into by way of a back door and a large quantity of clothing taken.

From indications there were four or five men in the gang. They took new shoes, clothes, hats, shirts, socks, underwear, etc. Some of their old clothing was left in the store where they had changed to the new. A large cash register, valued at \$1,000, was damaged heavily by the burglars in their attempt to open it. There was nothing in the register. It is usually left open, but last night was overlooked and left locked.

The full extent of the robbery cannot be stated until a more complete check of the stock can be made. It is estimated, however, it will total between \$200 and \$300. Ten bundles containing 120 shirts were among the missing articles.

The burglars left a number of auto tools in the store which they evidently used in entering the building and in opening the cash register. They were evidently traveling through the country by auto. No clue has yet been found of the robbers. Officers of all neighboring towns have been notified of the burglary, and are on the lookout for the men.
