Annual Fish Feed To Be Held Soon

Union County Wing, Fin and Fleetfoot Club Will Stage Annual Banquet.

The annual fish feed of the Wing, Fin and Fleetfoot club of Union county will be held about August 5, according to announcements made today by Secretary Al Andrews, who urges that members purchase their tickets now and avoid the rush. About 200 or more are expected to be seated when the fish feed is held.

One matter of importance that will be brought up at this time will be a demand by Eastern Oregon sportsmen for the increasing of the capacity of the Union Fish Hatchery three or four times its present capacity. Western Oregon has 17 fish hatcheries and Union, Malheur and Walla Walla counties, forming a great portion of Eastern Oregon, is supplied with but one hatchery.

Mr. Andrews, who, in addition to a communication has been received being secretary of the county club, is also a member of the directors of the Oregon State Sportsmen's Association, from J. H. Frederick, of Hood River, also a director of the state organization, relating to furthering the organization in Union county with the view of securing a full and comprehensive co-operation in respect to the propagation and protection of wild life and to increase a greater respect for the game laws of Oregon. The communication will be acted upon at a later date.

KNOCKOUT EXPECTED IN LIGHTWEIGHT GO

NEW YORK, July 21.—Followers of both Benny Leonard, champion, and Lew Tendler, Philadelphia challenger, predict that their fight next Monday night at the Yankee stadium for the world's lightweight championship title will end in a knockout.

Tendler's southpaw punch, the blow that had Leonard back on his heels in their battle at Boyle's Thirty acres, a year ago, is working to perfection, according to advisers from the challenger's training camp at Delanco N. J. He is confident it will bring him to his long sought goal, the lightweight throne.

Leonard, however, believes he has perfected a style of battle calculated to offset Tendler's portside advantage. He has trained daily for a month with four left handers. The champion declared he was in the best condition of his career and while he expects a stiff fight, expressed confidence in his ability to end it before the limit of 15 rounds. He will close his training camp tomorrow and return to New York.

ELGIN WINNER IN WALLAWA LEAGUE

ELGIN, July 21.—Elgin won the pennant for the Branch Line League last Sunday when the team from that town defeated Enterprise by a three to twelve score at the court house town. Bridge Being Repaired.
LEBANON, July 21.—A crew of railroad bridge men have arrived in Lebanon to repair the railroad bridge of the Southern Pacific over the South Santiam river, which was damaged last winter by the high water. The center pier of the bridge was undermined to such an extent that it settled to one side and had to be tressed to make it safe. It is said that a new foundation will be put under the pier down to bed rock, which was not done when it was first erected.

Records Broken at Crater Lake.
MEDFORD, July 21.—All attendance records at Crater Lake National Park have been broken thus far this season, according to John M. Scott, general passenger agent, who returned here from a visit to the lake today. Since July 1, 2199 cars and 9853 persons visited the park, while for the same period last year, which established a new record, the attendance was 1713 cars and 5825 persons.

Snappy Events Promised Fans

PORTLAND, July 21.—Some of the finest automobile racing ever seen in eastern Oregon is promised for Baker on Saturday and Sunday, August 4 and 5, when a big two-day program will be run off under the auspices of the Oregon-Washington Racing association. George Lott, head of the association and one of the best known auto race fans of Portland, returned last week from Baker where he concluded arrangements for the big event.

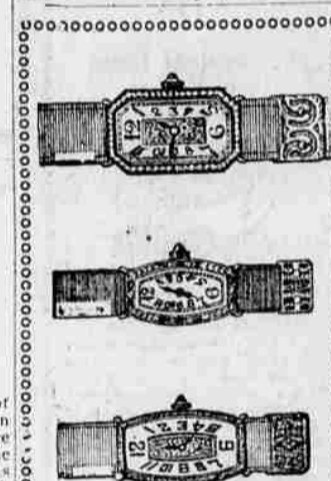
The Baker races will last two days and will be held on the Baker half-mile track, which will be put in finest possible shape for the event. The program for each day will include a race for light cars, race for heavy cars and a free-for-all sweepstakes, together with special events. All races will be under the sanction of the American Automobile association.

Already 13 of the fastest race cars of eastern Oregon have entered for the races, Lott announced, these being in addition to the fast cars of the Oregon-Washington Racing association, which will be shipped to Baker to compete. Among the latter will be the Stutz special with Pugeot motor which captured first place in the July 4 race at Spokane under the auspices of the American Legion, and the Rickenbacker special which captured second prize at the same race.

Lott's entire string of fast cars will be taken to Eugene for a race on Sunday, July 29, and immediately after that will be shipped to Baker to be groomed for the big two-day event there. The Oregon-Washington Racing association also expects to direct a program of racing at North Powder on the following Sunday, August 12, and will take their fast mounts from Baker on to North Powder. As a couple of the Lott racing cars have made better than a mile in 52 seconds on a circular track, some fast speed is expected for the races at Baker.

Dairy Law To Be Enforced.
HOOD RIVER, July 21.—C. L. Hawley, state dairy and food commissioner, has written to all local fruit and vegetable shippers warning them that the state law providing for the name and address and weight or number of the product appear on all containers will be rigidly enforced after July 24. Mr. Hawley stated that offenders will be arrested and the product confiscated.

German Resistance Weakens.
DUSSELDORF, Jul. headquarters here expressed the conviction Friday that the German resistance in the Ruhr was weakening. No sabotage incidents have been reported for the past six days. Thursday 572 trains were operated in the region, or something more than double the number running up to three days ago.

BIG WAREHOUSE ASSURED.
ROSEBURG, Or., July 21.—Construction of a large warehouse and loading station, to provide facilities for handling next year's broccoli crop, was decided on today by the Umpqua Valley Growers' association. The building will be located at Edenhower about one mile north of Roseburg and adjoining the Southern Pacific tracks. Two Southern Pacific engineers were here today making the preliminary surveys for the spur to be built, and active construction work on the building will start within three weeks.

The association this year shipped 40 carloads from Roseburg and next year expects to ship four or five times that number. Loading stations will also be maintained in Roseburg and Hiddle.

BANDSTAND IS DEDICATED.
ROSEBURG, Or., July 21.—The Douglas county concert band Tuesday night dedicated the new bandstand just completed, on the courthouse grounds and a record crowd participated in the event. Although a large crowd had been expected for the opening concert, everyone was surprised by the large turnout, which blocked the streets in all directions for a considerable distance. It was estimated that more than 4000 persons lighted with colored lamps heard the concert.
