Davis, a son, who lived on the ranch with his father. Mr. Davis was 43 years old. He is survived by another son, W. E. Davis, resident of Portland.

ALBANY, Ore., July 21.—The trial of George Parkes for the murder of Sheriff Dunlap started this afternoon shortly after the jury was completed. Judge Kelly adjourned court yesterday until 1 o'clock this afternoon so that more jurors could be called for the examination and within an hour after court convened the jury was complete and the opening statements of the two attorneys were made. Self-defense is the point upon which Gus L. Thacker, attorney for the defense, will base his fight for Parkes' freedom.

Tombstone Breaks Records

ALBANY, Ore., July 21.—A 700 pound rock with the engraved inscription "1841" was unearthed yesterday by E. H. Margason on his farm near Shedd. Consultation with pioneers has revealed no clue to its origin or to its history. The rock was found about 100 feet from the old Pacific highway.

The stone is of diamond shape and is about 21 inches long, 21 inches high and 13 inches wide. It was found protruding about two inches from the surface of the ground in the Margason pasture.

CHEAPER RADIO MESSAGES SOON

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, July 21.—Another great step in the development of wireless telegraphic transmission has been realized, says Senator Marconi, who has returned to London after a two months' experimental cruise in his yacht "Electra." A system has been evolved by the Italian inventor whereby wireless messages are transmitted with a minimum of electrical power, and at very low cost.

"We have transmitted messages up to a distance of 2,250 miles, not only with a very much smaller amount of power and energy, but faster and more cheaply than with the ordinary system of long-distance wireless," said Senator Marconi. "When the new system is adopted it will mean that a power station for long-distance work can be erected at much less cost than at present. I have telegraphed on this system from Cape Verde Islands, off the African coast, to London. To send messages clearly and more rapidly over those 2,500 miles took less power than a message from London to Paris by the ordinary methods."

Senator Marconi explained that these advantages were gained by the utilization of waves that have not before been used. Given the necessary mechanical element, he said, messages could be sent clearly seven times faster than the present rate, and that the public and the newspapers would ultimately have the benefit of much cheaper commercial charges. His opinion is that wireless is only in its infancy, and that the future has in store greater marvels than have been revealed in the past.

Commenting on recent experiments conducted by American inventors looking to privacy in wireless telephonic conversation, Senator Marconi said he was afraid such an achievement was still far off. "I do not say that wireless telegraphy will ever be an absolutely private means of transmission, but I will say that in future it will be possible to make it much more difficult for anyone to get messages not intended for them."

Senator Marconi proposes to go on another experimental trip in a few weeks' time, and later to try the new system of long-distance wireless from the coast of the United States to Europe.

Nothing less than an eclipse, however, could shut off California's wonderful sunshine.

FIND MASTODON ON CLAM.

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, July 21.—A portion of the skeleton of a mastodon has been found on a gold placer claim on the Snake River near here and excavation is going forward rapidly with hope that the complete remains of the prehistoric monster may be gathered together. The bones already found were uncovered fifteen feet below the level of the sand and 100 feet from the present course of the river.

TAG INDICATES FIRST OFFENSE.

HELENA, Mont., July 21.—In two Montana cities, Butte and Great Falls, ordinances have passed first reading to license automobile drivers. A driver convicted the first time for reckless driving would receive a license tag of a light color which would indicate one conviction. A second offense would result in a tag of a deep blue, and the third offense would result in the cancelling of the license so that the third time offender could no longer drive a car.

MARRIAGE SOLD FOR 250 CENTS.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, July 21.—Marriage licenses issued in Salt Lake county during June numbered 482, a new high record for any month. One couple paid for their license with 250 pennies remarking that they had started saving the pennies several months ago for the "grand occasion."

Detour Is Eliminated.

ALBANY, July 21.—Tourists and travelers who are using the main Pacific highway now no longer will be bothered by a rough detour around Marsden creek, east of Albany. The new concrete pavement was opened over this stretch last week and now the road to Salem is paved, with the exception of a piece near Jefferson, where the high water took out a piece of pavement last winter.

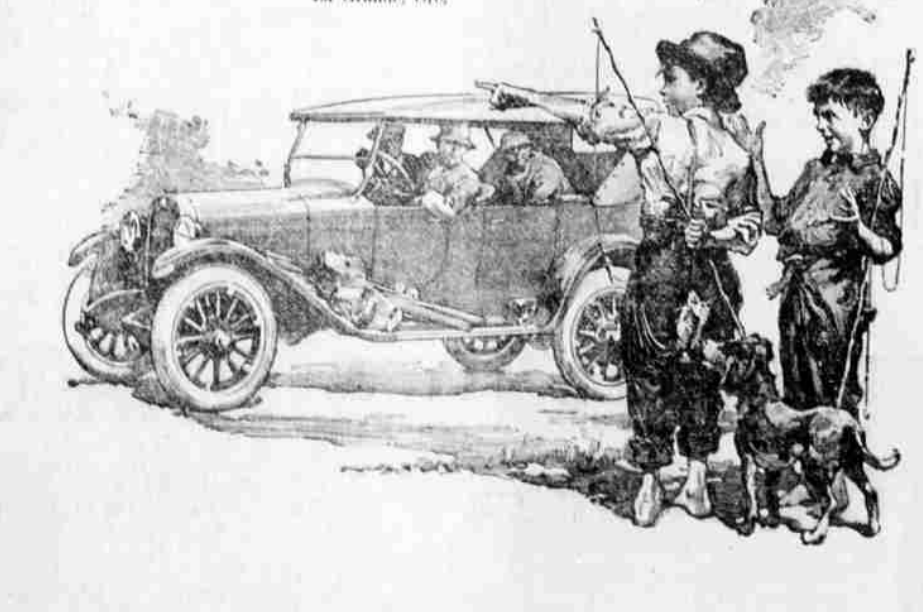
