La Grande Is Winner 11-9 In Swatfest

 under also got a one base hit, advancing Murchison to second, Gatchell fled out to Knight, Carter brought in Alexander and Murchison with a long single. Brazille singled and Carter scored on Davis' single. Blumenstein connected with three batters after Red Alexander fled out to Crews. With five men scored, Conley, pinch hitting for Orton, went to first on an error and attempted to gain second on a passed ball. Conley was too sure however and was caught loafing reaching for second.

Cove Protest.
 Whereupon, for the second time in the ninth inning, the Cove backers, many hundreds in number, flocked upon the playing field and protested the base umpire's decision. It was purely a case of crowd vs. umpire and the umpire (of course) won. The other disturbance came when Blumenstein stole home after the game had supposedly been called by Umpire in Chief Hudson. The crowd went back to the sidelines, pacified, when the run was allowed.

Reports reached La Grande today to the effect that Cove wished the game replayed, claiming that the ball, overthrown to first, that resulted in Conley being caught at second, was dead—saying that spectator touched the ball. The umpires both ruled otherwise, however, which leaves the game absolute.

Will Not Be Replayed.
 Umpire Fred Hoskins, who called Conley out and was backed by Umpire in Chief Hudson, personally stated to the writer that "the game was over and Conley was out—beyond all doubt."

Manager W. C. Crews, of the Pirates, this morning when questioned by the writer, stated: "We will not replay the game. There is no question about the decision. Ground rules at Cove were decided upon prior to the game as follows: One base on a passed ball but the runner must make the base. Conley didn't make it."

And that's that.

Game Interesting.
 But to get back to the game proper. Until the ninth inning, when White took a flight into the sky, La Grande was never in danger. Errors and extra-base hits were frequent on both sides. Some of the high spots in the game were: Clifford's spectacular catch of Hibdon's fly in the third; Peterson's catch of Orton's would have been a Texas leaguer in the fourth and Davis' homer in the eighth. Incidentally White pitched but three balls against Cove batters in the first inning—all three balls being grounded to the infield for easy outs.

La Grande had plenty of hitting strength yesterday. They smashed out a total of 13 singles against Cove's 12—and the Pirates hits came when they meant runs. Markham and Hoskins each got three hits, Crews, Knight and Clifford got two each, both of Clifford's being three baggers and Garity, White and Peterson bourn down on the pellet once.

La Grande made five errors and Cove muffed five also.

Next Sunday Cove plays Baker at Cove.

Markham scored Peterson with a two base hit and was in turn scored by Hoskins three base hit. Hoskins stole home. Rosenbaum walked and Clifford ended the inning by grounding to short. Three runs.

14. Cove: R. Alexander fled to right field, Fulp grounded to pitcher, Carter fled to center field.

15. La Grande: Knight fled to left field, Peterson fled to short, Markham hit for two bases, going third on short's error. Hoskins singled, scoring Markham, Rosenbaum went first on shortstop's error, Clifford struck out. One run, two errors.

16. Cove: Brazille grounded to first, Davis homed, Red Alexander went first on shortstop's error, Blumenstein was thrown out at first by pitcher, Orton fled to centerfield. One run, one error.

17. La Grande: Garity fouled to catcher, White grounded to pitcher, Crews grounded to short.

18. Cove: Murchison singled, R. Alexander singled, Gatchell grounded to third, Carter singled, scoring Murchison after, Brazille singled, Davis singled, scoring Carter, Blumenstein hit for three bases, scoring Brazille and Davis and in turn stole home. Conley went to first on an error and was caught going to second on an overthrow.—Five runs, one error.

LIGHTWEIGHT GO "NATURAL MATCH"

NEW YORK, July 23.—Benny Leonard, lightweight king, will battle his logical and most dangerous contender, in the opinion of ring critics, when he meets Lew Tendler, Philadelphia southpaw, in a 15-round title match Monday night at the Yankee stadium. The Leonard-Tendler go is one of the few "natural matches" for a championship that have been arranged in any boxing division this year. Leading contenders in other classes have been forced for the most part to remain in the background. Tendler, however, is getting his second chance within a year at the 135-pound crown.

Experts Back Champ.
 Leonard, who has held the lightweight throne against all comers for the last six years, will face his rival with the backing of a majority of experts, but there is no less confidence of victory in the challenger's camp. Both boxers rested Sunday at their homes after several weeks of preparation they will weigh in at 10 Monday.

Four other bouts are on the card, the first starting at 8 o'clock eastern daylight time, with the main contest scheduled to begin at 10 o'clock in the principal preliminary. Babe Herman, San Francisco lightweight, is matched with Joey Fox of England, for eight rounds, while Jack

Proke Alfalfa Weevil.
 CORVALLIS, July 23.—An exhaustive survey of the alfalfa weevil situation in Mathews and Baker counties and in the alfalfa district of Idaho, is about to be made by A. I. Lovett, professor of entomology, who will leave Corvallis this week-end. The plans are to determine the present distribution of the weevil in Oregon and the situation with regard to parasites. Professor Lovett will work with federal and Idaho specialists to check on control practices that are proving most effective, and endeavor to modify or fit them to Oregon conditions.
