Wallowa County Home Struck by Lightning

WALLOWA, July 23.—The Ernest Johnson residence in Lower Valley was the object of a very destructive bolt of lightning during the electrical storm recently. A part of the family had retired, and the older members were sitting in the sitting room at about 9:30 when a terrific crash shook the house. The charge ran in through the telephone and electric wires, breaking all over the house. Fire started in several places, and the concussion of the explosion loosened the joints of the sitting room. By a miracle, however, none of the occupants were shocked, although Hubert Johnson burned his hands badly in trying to move a trunk which had felt the effects of the bolt.

The charge tore loose the jills of a bay window, but a canary bird hanging in it did not stop singing. Five of the young folks were sleeping upstairs, and the electricity ran through one of the beds, knocking a hole in the floor. Two hundred and fifty feet of telephone wire was melted. A chandelier was knocked to pieces in the sitting room. A hole three feet in diameter was knocked in the south side of the house. Plaster and wall paper came down, and the ceiling boards in two rooms were loosened. The roof was damaged.

The fires which broke out at various of the light connections required a good deal of fighting, but prompt action saved the residence which is a large well built one. The electricity is believed to have come in over the wires, having first struck a tree. The house was insured through E. A. Searle.

Organize Sewing Club. COHVALLIS, July 22.—A sewing club of seven girls has been organized by Mrs. W. W. Burns of Troy, Wallowa county, in connection with the boys and girls club work supervised by the college. She writes that much interest is being shown by the girls, some of them traveling six or seven miles horseback to attend the meetings. 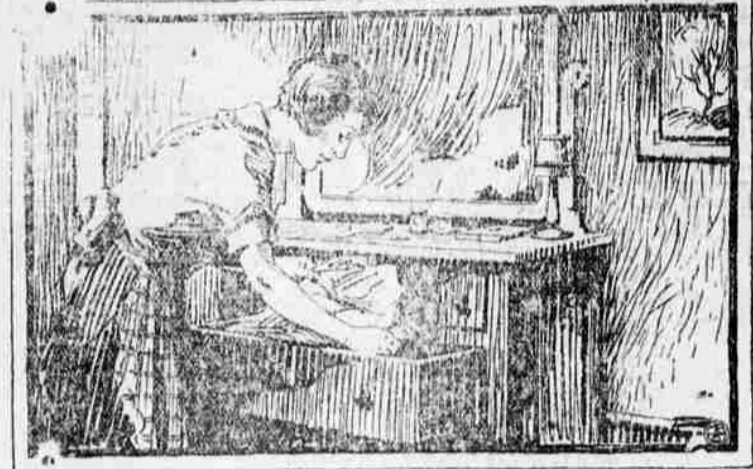
