Criqui, Dundee Battle Is Focal Point of Fight Fans

NEW YORK (AP)—Eugene Criqui of France, featherweight champion and Johnny Dundee, his American challenger, finished training Tuesday for their 15-round title match Thursday night at the Polo grounds. Both will do just enough exercising from now until the fight to keep on edge.

Dundee at his West Orange, N. J., quarters, covered eight miles on the road, Tuesday and later boxed six rounds. The Frenchman already nearly two pounds under the 126-pound featherweight limit, had a less strenuous program.

Tom O'Rourke, matchmaker of the Polo Grounds Athletic club, has completed a card of four preliminaries. Two of these will bring together "Irish Johnny" Curtin, Jersey City bantamweight, and Danny Edwards of California, and Leon Poutet, French sparring partner of Criqui, and Pat Mills, Irish lightweight.

Center of Attention.
NEW YORK (AP)—Fight fans here Tuesday began focusing their attention upon the second world's championship ring contest of the week, the match Thursday night at the Polo grounds between Eugene Criqui, French holder of the featherweight title and Johnny Dundee, New York Italian.

Criqui will risk against Dundee the crown he has worn less than two months. The Frenchman knocked out the veteran Johnny Kilbane for the title at the Polo grounds on June 2.

Against Dundee, a fast clever boxer, Criqui will be given a more severe test, experts believe, than when he fought Kilbane.

Dundee has done much fighting in lightweight ranks, where he won recognition as "Junior" light lightweight champion until he lost it recently by a decision to Jack Bernstein.

Kilbane's refusal to meet Dundee resulted last year in the champion's temporary suspension by the New York state athletic commission.

CALIFORNIA TO REVIVE RACING

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25.—Between 300 and 600 horses will be on hand November 3 for the opening of Tanforan, the new race track near here, when horse racing in California will be revived after 17 years, John D. Stelling, manager of the Pacific Coast Jockey club announced here.

The horses are coming from every part of the United States, and several of them will be here from Hawaii.

Prominent owners who will have California stables, Mr. Stelling said, include: C. K. G. Billings, Thomas Fortune Ryan, Harry Payne Whitney, Sam Hildreth, and A. K. Macomber, all of New York; Frank J. Kelley of Chicago; J. A. Widener, J. Kelley of Philadelphia; C. A. Hartwell of Honolulu; A. B. Spreckels, Rudolph Spreckels, and Herbert Fleischacker of San Francisco.

Frank J. Kelley will ship 60 horses from Kentucky to Warm Springs, Calif., this summer, Mr. Stelling announced. This will be a permanent stable for the horses owned by the Chicago sportsman, and the stable will include the famous Chatterton and Patience.

Four of G. J. Hartwell's horses have arrived from Honolulu for the Tanforan season, and three more will arrive this month, according to word received from Mr. Hartwell. The four horses are all by Harvester.

California is the home of many retired race horses, and the number is being increased each year, according to sporting authorities. Horses that have brought thousands of race fans to their feet by their final burst of speed on the home stretch, today trot the cool, green meadows of the Golden State.

Runnymere, sire of the famous Morvich, a California horse; Vorhies, full brother to Harvester, Dr. Legro and Hans Grenade are four of the retired horses in the A. B. Spreckels stable here. Palo Alto and War Cry are on the retired list in the Rudolph Spreckels stable. A. K. Macomber's list includes: War Fame, Liberty Loan, Gun Sight, and The Falconer, while Svenson Christenson has the fleet War Shot. In Nevada, George Wingfield's stallions include: Atheling, 2nd, Star Master, and Honeywood.
