Last of Man Eaters Are Captured In Samoan Isle

(By the Associated Press)

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa, June 15 by mail—The capture of the last of four wild man-eating savages who escaped from the island of New Hebrides in 1890 and landed on the island of Tutuila on a raft, ends the thirty-year dread of the island natives here for the man-eaters. The wild man was captured by an escaped prisoner who, being filled with remorse for his criminal record and ashamed again to face his fellow man, said he took to the hills of Pago Pago where he had planned to commit suicide.

While the escaped prisoner was making preparations to carry out his suicidal intent, he was confronted by the black savage. The convict "got the drop" on the wild man, bound him, and held him prisoner overnight. The next day the prisoner brought his savage captive to the Tutuila Naval Station here where the two took their stand in dramatic fashion under the Stars and Stripes. Samoans gathered, but, apparently, feared to attack the savages they had hunted for many years.

Robert Louis Stevenson, in one of his books, told of the escape of four black recruited laborers from a German plantation in New Hebrides. The men, Stevenson wrote, fled owing to their ill treatment, and escaped to Tutuila on a raft. One was killed. The three remaining blacks haunted the island not far from Pago Pago, towards the eastern end of Tutuila, and were occasionally seen by hunters.

ers. In the year 1890 one was caught by a young Samoan chief, and the captured savage said that one of the other two had died, leaving only one at large. This is the man who has just been brought in.

The woman having this distinction will have her expenses paid to Kansas City where she will be entertained by the war mothers of that locality. The gathering will include one war mother from each state in the union.

It was arranged here tonight whereby the state will bear the expenses of the war mother sent to Kansas City from Oregon. Mothers having lost sons in the world war are urged to write to Mrs. Hendricks, giving their names and the number of sons who fell while fighting for the defense of the allies. The gathering in Kansas City will be held early in October. It has the support of the American Legion and other military organizations.

ALASKAN AID ADVOCATED BY HOOVER

of commerce of reserves and other methods for the immediate limiting of the amount of fish taken, pending action by congress. "The need for conservation in Alaska has been recognized for over ten years, and has been a constant subject of debate and discussion, and I am greatly pleased to see the large measure of support given the administration for having substituted action for pious discussion. "Restriction on activities nearly always causes difference and trouble. I regret that the purpose of the reserves has been misrepresented deliberately to the people in western Alaska, not only as to the policy but as to the actual methods installed. However, the working of the reserves for a season has demonstrated to these people the untruth of these statements. "It is to be hoped that congress will take immediate action to give more constructive authority. In the meantime this administration does not intend to sit idly by denying responsibility under the authority already available but use it to the fullest effect. "This is the largest of Alaska industries. More than half her people and more than half her territorial revenues are dependent upon it. It can in time be built to much larger dimensions than at present. If nothing is done it will be lost in a few years. It is of vital importance to the American people as a source of national food supply. "New legislation, in order to be effective, must be of the broadest possible order. Because of the different topographical and biological problems of each locality, together with the differing rates of depletion of different species and many other factors, the method of regulation must vary with each locality, if we would serve the primary purpose of securing a rebuilding of the fish supply and at the same time do absolute justice to the canners and the fishermen in maintaining the industry and in the end gradually build a permanent Alaskan population devoted to the fisheries. "There are no universal panaceas for this whole problem in Alaska, neither seasonal restrictions nor limitation of pack nor limitation of any particular gear or its location are

universally applicable. Every district is a problem in itself. "The complete suppression of canning upon the Yukon has already increased the supply for natives, whites and dogs. In other places the regulations have reduced the pack of red salmon, which was the most depleted, and a reduction in the amount of gear that can be used by each canner on every species should tend to make the total pack less in proportion to the total run and therefore permit a large proportion of escapement to the spawning grounds. "As examples of variation of methods on Bristol Bay the regulations abolished the whole of the existing traps. In Cook Inlet, on the other hand, the independent fishermen as well as the cannery support the necessity for the great majority of the take being by traps. This is due to the physical character of the bays as well as to other factors. "Much experience will be required to evolve the most successful method of balancing the factors and securing the recuperation of the fish supply. All talk of definite laws universally applicable is nonsense. There must be variable and constructive legislation under broad authority. "Furthermore, in dealing with problems of so wide a human and property interest, there should be established under such legislation an appropriate method of appeal to some independent commission of authority. "The experience gained upon the reserves will be of great value in working out constructive legislation, and the administration has earnestly desired, and has received, a great deal of constructive suggestion from the people involved in the industry. "In order that there shall be definite machinery for recruiting such expression, and to secure the advice and co-operation of the various elements of the industry and the public at large in Alaska in the temporary measures now being applied, I shall, with the approval of the president, create a Board in Alaska to consider and advise with the department as to the regulations under the reserves. This board will be able to pass upon methods and grievances, and will, in an certain, not only reinforce constructive work but give full voice to the Alaskan people and make impossible the deliberate misrepresentation which has hitherto been current. "Our only purpose is to restore this industry. The responsibility rests upon the officials who have the authority to translate it into action. Pious statements, scientific discussion and political oratory will not spawn salmon. "Conservation can not be carried out without a temporary reduction in the amount of fish taken, on the one hand, or without constructive measures for enlarged propagation on the other. These are not agreeable duties, but they are part of the responsibility of public office and I am certain that they will receive the support of the well-thinking men and women of Alaska who treasure their country not alone for themselves but also for their children."
