Seeks Union High School
 Petitions asking for the formation of another high school district in Umatilla county have been filed in the office of Supt. W. W. Green by persons living in the Ukiah and Albee sections. According to the petition, the property owners would have three school districts combined into the new proposed Union high school district. These districts are numbers 78, Albee 80, Ukiah, and 24, which is east of Ukiah. If the district is finally formed it will be known as Union high school district number 7.—Pendleton Oregonian.

Alleged Wife-Beater
 Following a complaint from his neighbors, Joe Furest, of Seventh and Madison streets, was arrested and lodged in jail to answer a charge of assault and battery which was placed against him. Evidence points to the truth in the statements that Furest had resorted to cave-man methods with his wife. The hearing was held before Judge George E. Allen yesterday and the alleged wife-beater bound over to the grand jury under a bond of \$250, his trial to come up in November.—Baker Herald.

Wheat Crop is Heavy
 PENDLETON, July 27.—The record yield of wheat in Umatilla county so far this year was obtained by L. L. Rogers' on and near Adams, where Federation, a spring wheat, produced between 52 and 63 bushels, field average in two fields. In one field of 33 1/2 acres a total of 800 sacks of grain, or an average of 62 bushels, was produced. In another field of 45 acres, 1227 sacks were harvested, an average of 63 bushels. The fields were not uniform as to soil and yield and some of the best wheat is estimated by Fred Benhart, county agent, to have gone as high as 70 bushels, while in other spots the return was not so good. Federation is a spring wheat and was increased at the Burns experiment station.

Auto Goes Into Water
 PENDLETON, July 27.—After sliding over a 15-foot grade from the highway west of Pendleton near Barnhart and having their small coupe almost submerged in water, Frank Leverich of Pasco crawled out of a window in one of the side doors of the machine and pulled his mother and his wife out after him to safety. The water was about five feet deep.

Mr. Leverich's mother sustained minor injuries. The car careened over the bank after striking a road grader that was working on the highway.

SPENDING IS DRAW-BACK TO PROGRESS

 or as car-loadings bear to railroad earnings.
 "I have offices in 26 large cities and correspondents in 256 other cities. In every locality I find that the average man today is interested only in spending. People not only want to get rich quick but without working. People are buying recklessly without any thought about where the money is coming from with which to pay. Our young people seem to have the idea that dollar bills grow on trees and all they have to do is to pick them off. Almost no one wants to work. Very few want to produce. Earnest and industrious manual laborers, such as we had 25 years ago, are almost an unknown quantity. Everyone wants to ride in the car and no one wants to pull. Our percentage of producers is steadily decreasing and the percentage of middlemen is steadily increasing.

Condition Cannot Last.
 "Such conditions cannot continue forever. A dog may live on his tail for awhile, but it cannot continue this process indefinitely. People may try to get a living doing one another's washing, but when the clothes are worn out there will be no washing to do. A certain number of people can exist as middlemen. Middlemen are a necessary and serve a valuable economic function, but America's great need is producers, especially men and women filled with the desire to produce and with the joy of production. America's great need is a revival of the joy of work. America's great need is a revival of the desire to serve. America's great need is a revival of the habit of saving.

"I am not fearful for America in the long run, but rather I am a great optimist on this count and the people of this country. My love of America causes me to issue the warning that the attitude of the average young person today is not right toward his or her work. A doctor is not friendly to his patient if he blindly shuts his eyes to his patient's disease. One cannot be a true friend of the United States by blindly shutting his eyes to the wrong attitude of the new generation toward industry, service and thrift. It is this wrong attitude which has already caused business—as indicated by the Robinson-Patman act—to decline. The chart today stands at 2 per cent below normal compared with 1 per cent below normal at the beginning of the year."

 the title of champion. Dundee let up in his terrific pace somewhat until the seventh round. Then he took out again with a volley to head and body, but Craig, though he was staggering kept his feet. The end again seemed in sight in the eighth when Craig, blood dripping from his nose and mouth in a crimson stream, reeled about the ring under a spectacular barrage of blows.
 Again, in the ninth, Dundee failed to bring the Frenchman down as he watched his tactics in the next few rounds, trying for a fresh opening.
 Ovation for Frenchman.
 The twelfth saw him unleash another battering drive. He swung as hard as he could with both fists to Craig's head, but through a blood-covered face the Frenchman smiled and as he backed up to the ropes, he had taken Dundee's hardest and kept his feet and when he went to his corner, the crowd gave the batter-

ing champion a thunderous ovation. Craig's defensive tactics saved him in the thirteenth and fourteenth, but in the final round he again was on the verge of going down. Dundee tried savagely to land a knockout blow, but when the finishing bell rang, Craig, still groggy and bloody under a pummeling attack, was still doing his best to fight back.

Only the heart of a fighter, the instinct of a courageous ringman, enabled Craig to stand up under the withering fire. He had held his breath of ground in the dark days of Verdun and in the squared circle Thursday night he held his ground to the end. The jaw that had stopped a German bullet in the front line trenches proved equal to the hardest knocks human fists could bring to bear upon it. He went down to defeat battling to the finish.
