### Reconstructed River Adds 5 Miles to Detroit Docks

DETROIT, July 27.—The River Rouge, site of the great blast furnaces of the Ford Motor company, has been initiated to deep-draft vessels. For years a lax twisting stream, the river has been developed as an artery of the Detroit River at the behest of the Ford interests.

To permit the great ore carriers of the lakes to bring their cargoes direct to the blast furnaces, the river has been reconstructed. Instead of the twisting stream of former years, a new River Rouge has been created. From the mouth of the Detroit River to the Ford turning basin the stream is three miles long, almost two miles shorter than the old course. Its width at the mouth is 400 feet, and the average width along the dock lines is 200 feet, with a bottom width of 200 feet. The depth at low water is 21 feet.

A new canal, 3,000 feet long, was cut through the entire subdivision of property, avoiding an "S" turn where the river joins the basin.

Some 15 industries in addition to the Ford blast furnaces are operating along the banks of the Rouge, and with the improvement just completed six miles of docking facilities have been added to Detroit's waterfront. Heretofore the industries located at the Rouge have attracted an annual cargo tonnage of 2,000,000. The Ford plant alone expects to bring in 2,600,000 tons during 1923.

The total cost of the new Rouge, including bridges, dredging, and right of way is estimated at \$10,000,000.

### EDUCATE WOMEN OF ALL LANDS, SLOGAN

STOCKHOLM, July 27.—If the Baptist women of the world seize their present opportunity for the service of their generation they will adopt as their slogan "Educate the women of all lands," Mrs. Helen Barrett Montgomery of Rochester, N. Y., and former president of the Northern Baptist Convention, told the Baptist World Alliance recently during its special program given over to the consideration of women's work.

"When you educate a man you educate an individual, but when you ed-

ucate a woman you liberate a family," Mrs. Montgomery declared, and she said Baptist women of the world were performing no more significant service for womanhood today than through their Home and Foreign Mission Societies in establishing schools for the education of women in whom doors of opportunity have been closed heretofore. Seven schools of higher learning in the Orient are supported by the Women's Board of Foreign Missions, the speaker pointed out, while the women of various denominations and countries are co-operating in the support of 15 schools in the Orient which have for their sole purpose the provision of a trained Christian leadership for the women of that section of the world. A fund of \$3,000,000 for these schools was recently completed in the United States under the leadership of Mrs. Henry W. Peabody of Boston.

Christ was the great emancipator of women, Mrs. Montgomery declared, and in the proportion that the women of the world are educated and trained for service will the Kingdom of Christ be ushered in. With the larger education of women there have come larger opportunities in organization and service; it was set forth, and several reforms in temperance and other welfare lines indicate the effectiveness of women's power, once she is educated and trained, it was declared.

### Oil Company Claims Blow

EUGENE, Or., July 27.—An oil flow of five to ten barrels a day is claimed by the Guaranty Oil company in its test well on the Eugene Bible university property at the southwest edge of the city, the showings having been struck Sunday afternoon at a depth of 413 feet.

The Rev. David Eugene Olson, pro-motor, now in Minneapolis on business, predicted with his mysterious instruments that oil would be found at 125, 240 and 300, 320 foot levels. Word from him will be awaited before casing the hole at the present depth to find out how much oil has been struck.

Bandits Capture Engineer.

PEKING (AP)—Chinese bandits have captured Percy Wetherby, a British mining engineer near China. Province of Yunnan, according to a report received by the customs commissioner here Thursday. Wetherby formerly was a resident of Peking.

### THROWN THROUGH TWO WINDSHIELDS

MORNING, Ill., July 27.—Being thrown through the windshields of two different automobiles within an hour was the distressing experience of Mrs. Thomas Balderson near here recently.

The first accident occurred when the car in which she was riding was forced into a stump by another car which crowded it from the road. Mrs. Balderson was cut painfully about the face when she went through the windshield.

The second accident occurred on the way to the hospital in a borrowed car. In making a turn on the road, this car collided with another and Mrs. Balderson was again thrown forward through the plate glass. Her wounds were bleeding profusely when medical aid was finally secured.

### Churches In West Should Not Dictate to The East

STOCKHOLM, July 27.—Scandal is the argument that some churches in Europe and America give money they should determine the policies of churches on the foreign field, Dr. James H. Pennington, foreign secretary of the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society, told the Baptist World Alliance recently. "They may determine their own policies or recall their missionaries, but no board in the West is wise enough to dictate to the churches of the East," he said.

Men with a message are needed as missionaries, Mr. Pennington asserted. "They must be the best products of our western life," he said, "as this is the hour for special work in the mission field."

Dr. Pennington paid tribute to the pioneers in the mission field. "Today we regard them among our heroes," he said, "but sometimes they were looked on in the eyes of many of their own generation."

Our greatest need today is not money nor more missionaries, the speaker stated, but "the spiritual spirit is the need of the hour and we of the West cannot impart it to others except as we may have acquired it for ourselves. Facing the future our greatest need is for more of the spirit of the Cross of Calvary."

"At such an hour as this," Dr. Pennington continued, "the Baptists of the world enjoy an extraordinary opportunity for service," and in conclusion he stated: "The denomination which can prove most surely its purpose to serve disinterestedly is the one of which, in time, it will be inquired: 'In whose name and by what power have ye done these things?'"
