**REHABILITATED MEN NEARLY ALL PLACED**  
INDIANAPOLIS, July 28.—Assisted by the American Legion and by large industrial establishments, the United States Veterans Bureau has been able to place almost all of the 13,461 men rehabilitated between July 1, 1922 and June 1, 1923, according to information received by legion national headquarters in Indianapolis. Corporations are adding veterans trained by the Bureau to their lists of employees. Director Hines has announced that the Bethlehem Steel Company recently asked for 200 ship workers from among the rehabilitated men.

Legion Bulletin, Legion national adjutant, recently has offered the aid of employment bureaus maintained by legion posts in all sections in finding jobs for Veterans Bureau trainees.

**Retail Merchants Meet**

CHICAGO, July 28.—Fourteen hundred retail merchants from 33 states and Canada are expected to attend the fourth semi-annual meeting of the Interstate Merchants' Council here August 7-8.

**Dry Attorneys Active**  
MEDFORD, Ore., July 28.—Attorney O. C. Boggs first appeared in his capacity as special prohibition prosecutor today when M. S. Herlin, acquitted as a co-defendant with Nona B. Dunlap and her sister, in a sensational liquor trial two months ago, was arraigned before County Judge George A. Gardner at Jacksonville, charged with selling intoxicating liquor. His hearing was set for Monday morning next at Jacksonville with bonds of \$1,000. The complaint was signed by S. B. Swadlow, county prohibition agent. It is alleged that Herlin sold liquor last Saturday to Sam McClelland, in this city. His Studebaker automobile was seized for confiscation under the new state law.

**Grasshoppers Are Few**  
PRINEVILLE, Ore., July 27.—The report of L. P. Lockwood, entomologist of station and investigational work in Oregon, located at Forest Grove, to the effect that enough grasshoppers had been hatched on Summit prairie to destroy every vestige of vegetation, was a false alarm, according to James H. Scott, superintendent of the Prineville Land & Livestock company, whose Summit prairie ranch was reported to be the heaviest loser in the grasshopper ravages. "This company will put up 2000 tons of hay on this ranch and will employ 75 men to do it. It was pointed out by Mr. Scott as evidence to disprove the report."

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
