USED CAR PLAN IS EXPLAINED

What is considered by Mr. S. O. Voorhies of Southard and Shinn, to be the most vital acquisition to the organization since it secured the Buick franchise, was completed a few days ago when arrangements were made with the National Used Car Buyers Service to operate and market used cars under this new system. No chance, says Voorhies, of misrepresenting under this plan—no chance to "up" the year of manufacture—no chance to buy a stolen or encumbered car from which may result losses and law suits. A good, clean record, just like a deed or abstract to a piece of real estate.

The buyer is also protected from getting a car in poor mechanical condition, says Voorhies, because with each car is given a shop record card itemizing the shop improvements. Over seventy-two separate operations and inspections are made to each car before it is offered to the public. HUDLESON PLANS A NEW WAREHOUSE

NORTH POWDER, July 29.—W. A. Hudelson is planning on building a new warehouse on the lots next to the James Kirkland place, which are owned by Mr. Hudelson. The building will be 40x32 and equipped with a grain cleaning machine. The warehouse will not be a public institution, but will be used by Mr. Hudelson for private use only.

Lesson No. 1

Tasty Dishes for the Picnic Hamper

TO most families this is the season of picnics, lunches eaten out in the open under the trees, along some running stream or by the shore of some lake or bay.

Mother or the girls usually have the task of packing the picnic hamper, and it is sometimes perplexing to know just what to put in to satisfy the hearty appetites that a day's outing always insures.

Here are a few suggestions that others have found helpful and which may assist you to achieve variety in your picnic lunches.

For sandwiches, this filling will be found delicious:

Sandwich Filling

1 cream cheese (4 ounces), 2 tablespoons Carnation Milk, 2 tablespoons chopped nuts, 1 tablespoon chopped pickle, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Soften the cheese with the Carnation Milk; add the chopped pickle, nuts and salt. Spread between thin slices of Carnation Bread, given in Lesson 2. Lettuce leaves can be used in these sandwiches or they can be made without them.

A dainty and popular item for the picnic feast will be eggs prepared in the following manner:

Stuffed Eggs

4 eggs, 3 tablespoons NO-EGG Mayonnaise dressing (see One Hundred Tested Recipes), 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon finely chopped parsley.

Cook the eggs until hard. Cut lengthwise; remove yolks and mix thoroughly with the mayonnaise, parsley and salt. Refill the whites and fasten with a toothpick. This recipe serves four people.

One friend of mine has found that substantial dishes are also appreciated at picnic dinners and frequently prepares a large pan of macaroni and cheese. This can be wrapped to keep warm or can be quickly heated over a fire.

Macaroni and Cheese

1/2 cup macaroni, 1 1/2 quarts boiling water, 1/2 cup grated cheese, 1 1/2 cups thin white sauce, 1 tablespoon salt.

Break the macaroni in one inch pieces, cook in boiling salted water twenty minutes or until soft. Drain, pour over it cold water to prevent pieces sticking together. Put layer in buttered baking dish, sprinkle with grated cheese; repeat, pour thin white sauce (Lesson Number 4)
