AGREEMENT TO BE CUT IS DECISION

Southwest Wheat Growers Arrive at Conclusion That Too Much Wheat Is Being Grown in America.

CHICAGO, July 30.—(Special)—Reduction of wheat acreage, diversified farming and cooperative marketing are the keynotes of the resolutions adopted by the wheat producers' conference of the southwest at Wichita, Kansas. The southwestern wheat growers have put an organization into the field that is going to work for immediate results, they declare, as well as for methods to prevent distress to wheat growers in future years. At the close of the sessions it was stated that vigorous carrying out of the conference's program would go a long way toward putting the wheat industry on a sound basis "before snow flies this year." The wheat producers' conference of the southwest is composed of representatives from the hard wheat states of Kansas, Colorado, Missouri, Texas, Nebraska and Oklahoma. These states represent 2,250,000 acres now in wheat in excess of the total acreage of eight-elevenths of the total acreage of the United States in excess of that of 1912. No mention of government price-fixing is made in the resolutions. As one delegate pointed out, "The subject of political action was not mentioned in the debate. The hard wheat men know that their only salvation is by economic means." The features that stood out most prominently in the discussions were, summer fallowing in the hard wheat states, reduced acreage, improved cultural methods on the reduced acreage, diversified

Trade Commission Asks Legislation On Grain Trading

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Legislation to require the Chicago board of trade to make public daily the total volume of the preceding days' operations in futures and open trade in each option of each grain was included in recommendations made Sunday by the federal trade commission in the concluding section of its report on the methods and operations of grain exporters. The report, in compliance with a senate resolution, introduced by Senator Ladd, Republican, of North Dakota, also recommended that the Chicago board of trade be required to permit delivery of grain on futures contracts at other important markets, under proper safeguards and equitable terms, whenever necessary to prevent a squeeze or corner at Chicago.
