CREWS BUSY ON HIGHWAY GAPS

ENTERPRISE July 31.—Road work between Enterprise and La Grande on the several sections where the highway is in course of construction, is nearing completion. On the river route the course gravel has been spread nearly to town. The rock crusher near Gwynne keeps two huge trucks in constant operation. The road is for the most part nearly level, therefore the traveler will not find it difficult. On account of the unfinished cut near Wade's place a detour must be made and the road is rather rough in spots but likely no worse than the hill route. The rock for this section is secured from the cliffs near Gwynne and is darker than most of the rock used elsewhere. Further down on this route, at the cut near the Wade farm, road press is being made and it should not

WILL HAVE FOUR HIGHWAY CAMPS

ENTERPRISE July 31.—Dirt will be moving on the north highway in a few days, as the last formalities in the contract of W. E. Storm were straightened out on Tuesday. Most of Mr. Storm's outfit is already here, having come from Arlington, where he had a state highway contract. Part of his equipment did not arrive and he went out the first of the week to look it up. He has the usual road tools and equipment and some horses. Undoubtedly he will hire more horses locally, or, more probably, will subcontract parts of the work. Three camps will be established by the grade crews, one on the Wallowa National bank land, one at the old Simmons house and one on the E. M. & M. farm. The Simmons camp will be central and probably will be headquarters. For graving, a camp will be established on Clyde Sanders' farm, where the rock will be obtained, making four camps on the whole job. The state highway commission provides for the gravel pit or quarry and has made arrangements with Mr. Sanders independently of the county. The Sanders place is about midway on the present highway until and no gravel can be taken from it over the whole road. A start has been made already on construction work on the Lentine-Evans-Leap market road. George Shevar has a contract for the earth grade for the first stretch, from the end of the gravel on the Lentine-Evans county road, to the new river crossing at the Williams ranch. This bit of road runs due north and south and is the connecting link between the old county roads. The county seeks to let contracts on the other parts of this market road, continuing north up Parson creek into Leap.

TROTZKY, NOW RULING RUSSIA, IGNORES CLOCK

MOSCOW, July 31. (AP)—Since Premier Lenin became seriously ill, Leon Trotsky, Soviet Russia's War Commissar, has become the foremost figure in the Soviet Government. He has no working day. Every workman, laborer, or employee in Soviet Russia has an 8-hour working day conspicuously looked after by the Trade Union Council and guarded by the labor code. But Trotsky has none. His working day is much over 8 hours and as regards time, day and night are treated alike. Trotsky begins his day with the newspapers. They serve him as a means of every day human connection and business information. He reads them just as he would listen to a report by one of his officers and very often the newspaper information is followed by quick interpretations and action. Very often a news telegram, a reporter's item, or a quite unimportant interview, shows the road for an important decision. Then at various times during the day and night, Trotsky reads and dictates. He always reads with a pencil in hand, which he holds like a surgeon holds his instrument. He underlines, annotates, numbers the author's thoughts, associates them with potential notes—and the book returns from his anatomical desk like an embalmed corpse. He dictates queries, resolutions, departmental instructions and advices, orders, articles, pamphlets, brochures, friendly and sarcastic letters, replies, reminiscences—short and long ones, dry and fierce, always bright and stably polished. Everything clear, exact and business-like. A detachment of cyclists and motor cyclists, day and night, carry all over Moscow with war-time speed this state business literature of the War Commissar. During the day, the quiet of his cabinet is besieged by telephone

calls. In this way which Trotsky values as an economic means of communication, he disposes of half his work. In his work, Trotsky does only what he himself must and can do, everything else being completed by other—his assistants. He writes an article, others—librarians—will find from Marx or any other writer, as the case may be. Trotsky's office is a combination of simple but mighty things; stenographers, telephone switchboards and a good automobile—everything which curtails movement and serves to economize energy. He rests by passing from one work to another or indulging in sports when feeling very tired. His favorite sports are hunting, fishing, croquet and chess.

CORN BORER TO HAVE NEW ENEMY

BOSTON, July 31. (AP)—With the release of the olive tree wasps, termed habrobracon, in this vicinity, experts of the Bureau of Entomology, United States Department of Agriculture, hope they have set in motion an agency that will result in the destruction of the corn borer and the saving of millions of dollars to the farmers. The success of the experiment, entomologists say, will not be determined until observations have extended over a period of years. Imported from France, in which country and in Italy the habrobracon has proved a relentless enemy of the corn borer, four colonies of the insect were bred at the government laboratories in Arlington, Va. When the wasp can survive and flourish in the colder and more uneven climate of New England and the United States in general is a question still to be determined. The corn borer itself is an imported species, having come to America in shipments of European broom corn. Its ravages first attracted serious attention in 1917 in Eastern Massachusetts. Since that time it has worked steadily westward. Last year the borer caused damage estimated at \$1,000,000 in this state alone. Last year the borer, which in appearance resembles a caterpillar, not only attacks corn but inflicts injury upon crops of beets, celery, beans, rhubarb, potatoes, peppers, buckwheat, and clover. Altogether, investigators have found the borer guilty of damaging 211 varieties of plants. The habrobracon is said to injure no crop, confining its attacks to the borer, the gypsy and the brown tail moths. The wasps are very small, with bodies about the size of the head of a pin. The female wasp attaches itself to the corn borer and lays its eggs on it. These, when they hatch, at first paralyze and later kill the borer. The battle between borer and habrobracon began with the release of colonies of 250,000 habrobracons each in Saugus, Cambridge, Malden and Arlington. Further experiments are being made by government entomologists with a view to finding other insects which may check the spread of the borer.

JUSTICE BALKS ON "TRAP" LAW

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., July 31.—Prohibition of "speed traps" by motorcycle officers, by the bill passed by the last California legislature, is unconstitutional and will not be observed in his court, according to Justice of the Peace C. E. George of this city. The measure will go into effect September 1. "It is the prerogative of the court and not of the legislature to determine what evidence shall be admitted," declared Justice George.

CRINOLINE GOWN CAUSES TURMOIL

LONDON, July 31.—Feminine London is in an uproar over the newest revolution of the dress designers—the return of the bustle and the crinoline. The new fall models are revealed as having skirts which billow out from the waist in crinoline buoyancy and extend to the points of the wearer's toes, with close-fitting waists which, in contrast to the skirts, create the illusion of a wasp waist. Consideration has resulted among Dame Fashion's devotees. Paris is blamed for starting the "new" vogue, and modern women are complaining that while it may suit the demure beauty of the debutante, they cannot be hampered by these bygone modes in the rush of everyday life. And so it goes on. Dressmakers, as well as the wearers-to-be, are divided in their opinions as to the advisability of the threatened revolution. Some dressmakers are compromising by displaying quaint picture dresses which combine the modern with the old-fashioned, while others are refusing to have anything at all to do with the crinoline. It seems that in all probability some modified dress will replace the exaggerated crinoline.
