

# SUMMER CAMPS DRAW HEAVILY

## Government Has Twenty-Five Military Camps in Operation for Vacation Periods.

CHICAGO, Aug. 1. (AP)—In the last days of July some 20,000 young men left their homes to spend a month in one or another of the 25 military camps which the Government has organized for this summer, according to the announcement made by the Military Training Camps Association here recently.

Health in mind, body and character is the primary aim of the Citizens' Camps to which young men between 17 and 24 are admitted for a month of training at government expense, and these camps are located at carefully selected sites in various parts of the country, so that no one need travel more than two or three hundred miles from his own home.

In making the announcement, George T. James, the executive secretary of the Association, says:

"The camps are conducted by the Regular Army, the National Guard and the Organized Reserves, and no pains are spared to make the month of training an enjoyment and a profit to all who attend. Applications are accepted only after careful physical examination and with the endorsement of good character from reliable citizens, and in every detail the camps live up to the highest standards of American home life."

"All expenses, including transportation, are paid by the government, but in return it asks that every young man go to camp with an earnest desire to return a better citizen. No finer education ideal can be found in all history since the days of ancient Greece than underlies the Citizens' Camps of 1923. The daily program is devoted to interest and strength, is devised to interest and strengthen. The morning hours are given to a carefully graduated course of military training from ordinary infantry drill through a succession of other branches of the service, the cavalry, engineers, field and coast artillery, signal corps and air service. The afternoons are devoted to all forms of physical training and athletics, ball, tennis, swimming, boxing, wrestling and track work, all under expert direction and conducted with a view to physical health and good sportsmanship. Ample entertainment is arranged for the evening hours."

"Religious life is not neglected, since provision is made for voluntary worship on appropriate occasions for men of all faiths. Army Chaplains look after the moral welfare of the men enrolled and army hostesses arrange their social gatherings. Comfortable and well arranged quarters are provided with libraries, reading rooms, cards, checkers, and chess tables and pianos. The government provides a daily ration of nearly 70¢ and competent cooks prepare meals which compare most favorably with the best family or hotel tables. The men are quartered either in permanent barracks or in tent cities, carefully laid out in company streets, not more than six men to each large size army tent on comfortable cots, every tent with substantial board flooring."

The Military Training Camps Association of the United States is promoting the summer camps and securing through its nationwide organization the interest and cooperation of prominent citizens in every part of the country.

## WOMAN'S ATTIRE AROUSES IRE OF GREEK ZEALOTS

ATHENS, Aug. 1. (AP)—Fashionable women in Athens, and foreign women who follow the modern trend in dress, are being terrorized by the violent activities of a local

organization which terms itself "the Zealots of Christ."

The members of this association have taken a vow to compel modesty in women's dress by force. Women wearing low necked gowns or going about with bare arms are often roughly handled, and the exposed parts of their person are smeared with tar.

In several cases recently the male escorts of women thus attacked have given the roughs some very severe beatings, but nevertheless the systematic campaign of molestation goes on.

## SCIENTISTS WILL VISIT AUSTRALIA

TALLULAH, Ia., Aug. 1. (AP)—Entomologists at the United States Department of Agriculture Experiment Station here hope to see, as a result of their researches, the enactment of uniform state laws to compel the dusting of all cotton with calcium arsenate from airplanes, or by auxiliary machinery where planes cannot be utilized. The dusting, it is claimed, would result in the maximum control of the boll weevil, which has caused the loss of untold millions of dollars to the cotton growers of the south.

The boll weevil has been controlled on dusted acreage, it is stated, but untreated acreage has permitted the reproduction of the pest and a continuation of devastation. The weevil depends primarily upon the cotton plant for food, and the poisoning of its entire food supply, according to experts, would permit maximum control. This can be done only through the compulsory treatment of all cotton, and legislative acts are regarded as necessary for a successful campaign.

The entomologists are using airplanes here in their experiments, after having tried many machines for distributing dry calcium arsenate and the poison in solution. They declare the dry poison offers the greatest possibilities of control, as it can be broken up into particles fine enough to reach all parts of the plant, which is not possible with the water globules.

One of the greatest problems facing the experimenters was the determination of a proper distributing apparatus. An apparatus that depends upon the velocity of the air now is in use and the entomologists believe the distribution problem has been solved. It is known as the Venturi tube, a horn shaped contrivance without any interior devices to impede the air current. At the rear end are pieces to break up the poison into four streams which flow outward and downward. The poison is supplied to the tube through a slide valve in a hopper located in the cockpit of the plane.

From five to six pounds of calcium arsenate are used on each acre at an average cost of \$1.00, and it is believed the airplane will save at least one pound to the acre, representing an enormous reduction in the aggregate during a season. The entomologists can be obtained through six applications, during the season.

shows, divorces numbered seven to every 100,000 persons. Divorces in the United States, according to official figures for the last year on record, numbered 112 to every 100,000 people.

"The 1922 figures," says the report, "probably indicate that the wave of divorce due to the war has reached its highest point and is now on the decline. Total decrees granted last year showed a reduction of four compared with 1921. The remarkably low per cent of divorces shows the stability of Canadian homes and institutions."

Of the total divorces granted, husbands received 316, or about 60 per cent, and wives 228, or about 40 per cent. British Columbia led in decrees issued, with 138, followed by Alberta with 129 and Manitoba with 97. One province, Prince Edward Island granted no divorces. Only one divorce has been granted in this province since 1868, and that was in 1922.

The greater per cent of the divorced were residents of cities. Comparatively few applications were made among the agricultural population.

The tracts ranged in size from 40 to 120 acres, and the prices accepted ranged from \$50 to about \$90, the acre. The land
