CHESS TOURNEY PLAY CHANGES

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—When Joseph Reiding, of San Francisco, introduced the young Cuban, Jose Capablanca, to chess circles in New York, he little thought his juvenile friend would one day defeat the venerable Lasker and become chess champion of the world.

Not did anyone imagine twenty years ago that a game with such a history and well-defined technique as chess would see such changes in so comparatively short a time.

In fact, it is scarcely ten years since a new race of players has arisen, such with a new idea and often with most revolutionary opinions on the best way to open the game. It may interest even the layman to know that a distinguished European player recently remarked: "If the first player plays his king's pawn to his king's fourth square for his first move he then has a bad, if not a lost game."

This statement is not agreed to by most chess players, but it well illustrates the present revolutionary tendencies in the game.

San Francisco today had the opportunity of watching the play of the best chess players in the United States, when the twenty-fourth annual tournament of the Western Chess Association opened here.

The tournament is to be played in the rooms of the Mechanics' Institute Chess Club. It could not have been held at a more auspicious time. Chess circles are a-buzzing with practice matches and what not.

The interest in the game was never greater throughout the country. Several private schools in California have added chess to their course, and give instruction on the royal game.

London's Many Coal Fires cover City With Soot.

LONDON, July 3 (By Mail).—London's atmosphere is said by experts to be the smokiest and most polluted in the world. At 10 o'clock one day recently 10 tons of soot were floating about the capital. Twenty tons is an average amount for any day in June.

The smoke and soot are due largely to the fact that most homes, offices, factories and hotels in the capital are heated by the old-fashioned coal fire, which gives off excessive smoke. The Englishman loves his open hearth too much to bother with steam heat or gas and electric appliances.

Although mining men appreciate the wisdom of breaking down the immigration barriers entirely, they feel there should be no abridgement of opportunity in the United States for effective labor and for selecting the right type of immigrant, according to officials of the organization.

Additional emphasis will be placed on the use of labor saving machinery and equipment in mining enterprises. The American Mining Congress, officials say, has been advocating modernization of the mining industry and the standard
